The Community Council was formed with the object of promoting the well-being of the resident community, and that is exactly what we try to do,

We meet at intervals of 2-3 months, or sooner if some urgent business should arise. All meetings are open to the public, but right of speech is only given to those who have obtained the unanimous permission of the committee, or have notified the secretary 7 days before the meeting of their desire to speak on a particular subject,

Over the months, we have been instrumental in having the pavements along the main road restored, overhanging hedgerows attended to, and many similar matters put right. Unfortunately, after repeated letters among other forms of approach, we have not been successful in having the main bus stop and shelter replaced. We have been informed that we are definitely in the "queue" so we shall just have to contain our souls in patience.

Many interesting projects are currently under discussion, and the outcome will be announced in future news-sheets.
