Dear Readers,

After a late spell of good weather we seem to be back to the winds and rain and it feels as if the summer is definitely over. Most of the winter activities are under way, new children settling into school and older children settling into new jobs or starting at places of further education.

GLENFARG COMMUNITY COUNCIL Extra-ordinary General Meeting

Mr. Hodgetts from the Water Division of Fife County Council and a representative of H.G. Gibbons the Contractor attended the above meeting recently. I am sure everyone has noticed the signs of activity at Candy and these representatives were able to explain what was being done and why and were able to answer questions from the public.

The following is an extract of a report by Fife Regional Council regarding the River Earn Scheme:-

"Many options have been considered for meeting Fife Region's future water requirements. The River Earn Scheme, of which the pipeline through Glenfarg is part, is the chosen solution.

Alternative schemes considered, but rejected were:-

1. Loch Leven - Untreatable water - high nitrate levels from agricultural

fertilisers on catchment area.

2. New Impounding Reservoirs - No suitable sites for an economic dam. Large loss of agricultural

land involved.

3. Boreholes in Fife - Insufficient water for long-term abstraction. High pumping

costs.

Part of the River Earn Scheme consists of;-

A 1000mm diameter gravity water main from the Treatment Works at Glenfarg to the Glenrothes area, a distance of 12 miles. It is this main which passes through Glenfarg Village, and from which two branches will supply water to the village and Bridge of Earn Hospital. The lower section 81 miles long is laid, this being done for operational reasons as this section could be used in the existing water distribution network to increase water flow into Fife.

The mainlaying in the village will be carried out under the following conditions:-

- (a) No blasting of rock will be-allowed in Glenfarg under any circumstances.
- (b) No excavation will take place other than. between 0900 hours and 1600 hours,
- (c) All exca7ation must be backfilled and made safe at the end of ea ch working day.
- (d) Access for pedestrians must be maintained at all times.
- (e) Vehicle access must be posible between the hours of 1600 and 0900.
- (f) Damage of any description caused by vibration or noise will be the sole responsibility of the Contractor.
- (g) Further specific restrictions are placed on the Contractor when working in the garden near Arngask Church.

Closure of the roads (Church Brae, Duncrievie Road) will be necessary, but only one of these roads will be closed at any one time.

Mainlaying through the village is expected to take about one month, commencing early October, 1981.

After the Extra-ordinary meeting held on the 7th September, in the Village Hall to hear about the Water Works at Candy Farm as reported elsewhere in this newsletter, a Community Council meeting took place. At this meeting 20 members of the public and 10 Councillors were present.

It was reported that 182 children up to the age of 12 years of age had received a gift at the Royal Wedding Day Party, and it was agreed that monies remaining from those given and promised by the Community Council should be added to the School's Capital Fund.

Many complaints had been received regarding the fouling of the pavements and the playing area around the swings in Wallace Park. As this causes a serious health hazard, it is requested that dog owners show a sense of responsibility in this matter. One member of the village takes clearing up tools out with her, and in the States it is a legal requirement. Can we have voluntary cooperation?

Another concern is the practice of playing golf in Wallace Park, and we draw your attention to the Bye-law that forbids this.

Whilst requesting e real concern for others may we ask that hedges and trees be cut back so that they do not overhang the pavement creating a need to move into the road, and also that the dumping of rubbish at the end of Greenbank Crescent be discontinued.

The Director of Leisure and Recreation has promised to have the moles that are disturbing the grounds of the New Arngask Cemetery dealt with, and is to investigate our request to have the walls repaired.

ARNGASK SCHOOL

The new session got off to an excellent start and this was largely due to the fine weather of the past weeks. Fifteen infants were enrolled in P1, bringing the school roll up once again to 97. The school will close for the Autumn holidays on Friday 9th October and will resume on Monday 19th October.

Mr. Ross was pleased to accept the generous offer made by the Folk Club to update the School Honours Board. This work has now been done and thanks are due to Mr. Andy Ramage for doing it so efficiently.

A collection organised by Mr. Ross on behalf of the Royal Scottish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to children realised the sum of £46.42. THE DOG OWNERS CODE OF PRACTICE FOR PARKS & PUBLIC PLACES

Always read and observe the byelaws and regulations which apply in public parks and open spaces. These are generally displayed at the entrance to parks or are available from the local authority. Co-operate with park staff in the exercise of their duties.

Even when your dog is off the lead please ensure that it is under control and does not interfere with other people. At all times respect the rights of other park users. When sports pitches are in use it is particularly important to keep your dog on the lead.

Encourage your dog to defecate at home before you leave for an exercise area, or in the gutter on the way.

Avoid indiscriminate fouling. Do not allow your dog to foul sports pitches or the areas around benches. If your dog does foul a sports pitch, please remove the faeces.

Do not allow your dog access to children's play areas or ornamental gardens, even when on a lead.

Do not let your dog out on its own unsupervised, even if you do live near a park or public places where the dog may like to wander.
