COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the Community Council Meeting held on the 6th of December, eight Council1ors, the District Councillor Mr. P. Young, and 6 members of the public were present. Apologies were received from Sir Alan Smith and Mr. Bob Millar.

Prior to the Council Meeting a Special Meeting was held to hear Mr. C. Downs of the Department of Leisure and Recreation outline his proposals for improvements to the play equipment facilities in Wallace Park. New equipment would include a 30 ft. (approx.10m) stainless steel slide that would follow the contour of a natural slope some 9 ins. (230mm) above ground level, two swings and a fenced off sand pit. All installation work, landscaping and maintenance would be undertaken by the Department of Leisure and Recreation, but approximately 50% of the cost of the equipment would have to be met by the Community. A plan of the proposed layout is on view in the Post Office window, and any comments on the scheme should be sent to the Secretary (2 Elm Row) in writing please.

Letters to and from the Divisional Surveyor regarding the reinstatement of Church Brae and Duncrievie Road were tabled. Although the supply of two further salt bins has been requested these have not yet been agreed to.

It was reported at the meeting that the Ash Tree in Ash Grove was basically sound, but required surgery and this was to have been carried out by the Department of Leisure and Recreation. However when it was re-examined it was decided that more drastic action was necessary, and that it had to be removed. This should have been done by-the time of publication of this Newsletter.

The Tay District Salmon Fisheries Board had been contacted regarding the state of the River Farg down the Glen, and they are to investigate.

The Depute Director of Housing had promised to allocate garage sites, but action has been disappointingly slow-despite various chasers!

The next Council Meeting will be held in the Ante-Room of the Village Hall on the 7th of March at 7.30 p.m., and the A.G.M. on the 23th March.

The following Councillors retire at the A.G.M. after their 3 years' service, but are eligible for re-nomination. Mr. David Rutherford, Mr. Campbell Watson, and Mr. George Ross. Nomination Papers will be available at the meeting on the 7th and should be returned to the Secretary by the 13th of March.
