Some of the areas of the original document are extremely faint, so there may be some inaccuracies in digitisation.

Comment was also made about motorists' disregard of the 40 m.p.h. speed limit through the Village. Mr. Millar reported a balance in hand of £331.60.

We have repeatedly asked that the skip in the car-park be used with consideration for those who live in Greenbank Crescent, and if this is not respected then we may have to request its removal. So please stop misusing this facility by overfilling it or placing loose paper or unsuitable material in it.

PERTH COLLEGE "OPENS" OUT

In 1982 Perth College of Further Education took its first tentative step into the field of "Open Learning" - in effect taking the College to the students.

Since then the scheme has proved a great success, with more than 500 students involved. Some are located as far away as Orkney and South Uist but most come from the immediate region - particularly Highland Perthshire, Strathmore and Strathearn.

There are many people who can't attend college classes for a variety of reasons - distance or remoteness, lack of transport, disability, shift work, or too busy a home schedule. It is for these that the system was developed - to reach the parts the other College courses can't.

AB a result the "type" of student varies considerably in age from 16 to over 70, and in reasons for doing the course, from a wish to improve career prospects to a need for an interest and self-fulfillment. Exams are purely optional and everyone is welcome to work at his/her own pace. Many, like a middle aged mum who had left school 23 years ago, begin with feelings of "apprehension" but end up confidently sitting the exam and finding the whole experience "very enjoyable".

This year the array of courses on offer has been expanded to include a wide range of subjects involving every one of the College's departments. They include courses in building, engineering, catering, business studies, computing and childcare as well as a wide range of SCE '0' and 'H' grades and GCE 'A' levels.

Particularly topical as visitors continue to pour into the region, is the Course in Guest House Administration, specially designed to help owners cope with the problems involved in the day-to-day running of a B & B Business.

Learning by this method involves home-based study but differs from the old-fashioned correspondence courses in two important aspects. Firstly, the courses are designed to be straightforward, enjoyable and entertaining and deliberately avoid the "dry" style of traditional academic learning. Secondly, they link each student with a personal tutor, to be contacted for support and guidance every step of the way. Group meetings are arranged either at the College or at a place nearer home to give students a chance to exercise practical skills and meet their tutor and fellow students face-to-face.
