A letter from the Depute Director of Housing regarding the footpath from Greenbank Crescent to the school was tabled, and it was agreed that the Secretary should write again requesting a more suitable surface finish. The Secretary reported that the Department of Leisure and Recreation were to modify the car park in Wallace Park in an effort to stop the surface being scuffed by turning traffic. Fouling by dogs in Wallace Park was still a problem; a suggestion was made that the very untidy area of land beyond Elm Row could become a "dog-walk". The owner of the land is to be sought. The Treasurer reported, a satisfactory balance in hand. The Secretary reported that the Regional Councils Road's Department had agreed to resurface the path down Ladeside. this should be done in the near future. A letter from the same Department had been sent to all occupiers of properties in Elm Row backing onto the Main Street requesting that the overhanging branches be cut back.
