Dear Reader,

Another year and for us a comparatively easy start to the year. With pictures of falling snow and blizzards in the Southern Counties we have had a cold spell but only more recently some very slushy snow. We hope it continues and we do not have a repeat of the heavy falls last winter. The potential sledgers and skiers are not so happy.

Otherwise Christmas and the New Year passed quietly - not much signs of wild celebrations at New Year anyway. The New Year has also seen the coming of a new Minister to the village and we wish him well and look forward to getting to know him and his family.

The news seems meagre this month - perhaps Secretaries and Club organisers will feel more lively by the middle of March with Spring approaching and will put pen to paper.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the meeting on 3rd December 1984 the problem of further assistance for the monthly collection of paper etc. in the village was raised. For many years now this task has been undertaken by retired people in the village plus one younger person, and it is now found that a 'younger' element will have to be found if this source of revenue is to continue. As you know the money goes towards the Village Hall funds to enable the committee to keep the rental of the hall to the minimum, thus all the organisations in the village benefit from the revenue (which is approx. £300 annually). The present 'incumbents' now feel that the work is too onerous for them, and it would be a pity if this source of income was to cease. All that is asked is for 4 younger men to come along on the FIRST Saturday of every month to the shed at Bridge House, Hayfield Road, between 10 a.m. and 11.30 a.m., to tie up the papers etc. In the case of villagers who put out their papers, magazines and cardboard, if they would tie them up into separate bundles, (magazines, i.e. any papers with staples in them), this would greatly facilitate the work. I am sure the 'regulars' won't mind if Colin Brough and Willie Coventry, who go round the village and outlying districts at their own expense and time to collect the papers, are singled out for special thanks.

Another question which arose at the December meeting was that of the unsatisfactory surface of the footpath in the car park area leading to the side entrance of the school, the state of which is that mothers are unable to Push their buggies etc. along it. Approach to tee District Council has received a reply that the cost of tarmac-ing the surface would be too expensive and the funds are not available. Our new District Councillor, Mrs. Ferrand, has been pursuing the matter with little result. Apart from the footpath the question of the disgraceful state of the whole car park was raised, but as usual, the reply 'no funds'.

Another village seat has 'disappeared', that is the one between the Hilton Farm and the road down to the Water Works. That is now 3 that have gone, ancl they are sadly missed by the older people who have a walk around the village from time to time. Again no sympathy from the District Council when approached for replacements.

At the meeting the Secretary, Mr. Tarling, stated that the strip of land parallel to the main road (entrance through Gallowhill), is now the property of the liquidators of the Dreit Co., and is for sale for £1,000, so anyone with ideas and £1,000, contact the Community Council in time for the next meeting on 4th March 1985. The Community Council finances at the end of 1984 stood at £364.34, so obviously there is not much it can do in acquiring the strip of land.

Mrs. Ferrand, the District Councillor, has intimated that <u>half an hour prior to each Community</u> <u>Council meeting</u> she will be in attendance for consultation with any person wishing to do so.

The Annual General Meeting of the Community Council meeting will be held in the village hall at 7.30 p.m. on the 25th March 1985, when it is hoped that the villagers will be sufficiently interested to attend.

The next normal Council meeting will be on Monday the 4th of March at 7.30 p.m. Mrs. R. Ferrand will be in attendance at 7 p.m. This year the 3 Councillors who retire are Mrs. M. Lambie, Mr. C. Brough, and the Secretary R.G. Tarling. All are eligible for renomination, and nomination papers will be available at the meeting on the 4th March, or from the Secretary.
