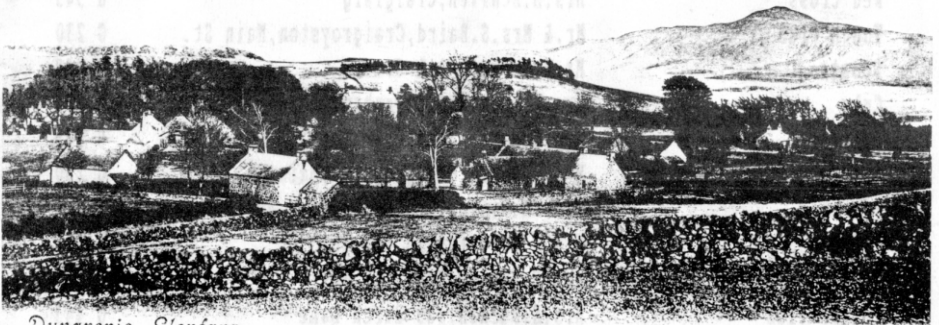

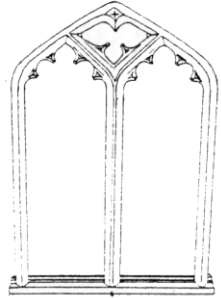

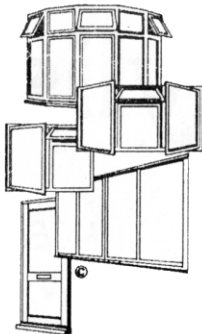

EDITORIAL

Well, once again, the spring is sprung, the grass is ris, I wonder where the birdies is! Presumably searching for materials to build their nests. Seriously though, it is good to see all the spring flowers peeping up in readiness for the Community Council's competition - let's hope they won't soon be buried beneath a blanket of snow. We may not have a white Christmas, but we do usually seem to have a white Easter!

On a less frivolous note, Mr. Lindsay has asked me to remind readers that it now costs 43p to produce one copy of the newsletter. While it is still issued free of charge, please remember the collecting tin in the Post Office, or hand any donations to Mr. Lindsay or me.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The Community Council held their bi-monthly meeting on 5 March 1990 in the Village Hall. Seven Community Councillors were at the meeting, and Cllr.J.M.Lindsay, chairman, welcomed everyone. Among those present were members of PKDC, who had been invited to an open meeting to discuss controversial plans for development in the village. The Chairman opened the Council meeting, then adjourned it, so that the public meeting could discuss objections to the proposed conversion of the steadings of Arngask Farm into 6 residential units, for a property developer from England. Fears were expressed, by nearby residents, about the development of the area, and the loss of the amenity value of. Arngask, arising from the rapidity of piece meal development and in fill development in the village. Mr. Sleith, of PKDC Planning dept., agreeing that there was a continuing change in land use, stated that the District Council considers each planning application on its merits, but that its general policy is to

prohibit sporadic housing development in rural areas. To this end, the D.C. would look more favourably on plans to develop existing properties, than on plans to erect new buildings. A member of the public expressed reassurance at this statement, but, equally, some concern at not knowing the intention of the applicant, who had given no indication of his plans for further development. Cllr. McFarlane asked what safeguards exist to ensure that the buildings erected, or the conversions of existing buildings, are in accordance with plans approved by the D.C. The reply was that the D.C. had powers to ensure that only approved plans were put into effect, and that the revision of a plan was not guaranteed approval. It was further stated that seldom was a retrospective plan approved. Details of this meeting are too lengthy to be printed here, but a full report may be obtained in the minutes, available at the Post Office.

The Chairman closed the public meeting, thanking the officials from PKDC for attending and answering questions. Officials remaining for the C.C. meeting were Regn. Cllr., Sir Alan Smith, D.C. Mrs. Lena Graham and Community Councillors. The C.C. meeting then reconvened, the minutes of the meeting of 8 January 1990 being confirmed.

RIGHTS OF WAY Cllr. McFarlane, convenor of the sub-committee, reported that proceedings for producing a guide to Rights of Way for the villagers and visitors were underway, and it was hoped that a map would be produced. He added that the committee would like a list, showing names, dates and times of use for any Right of Way. This information is of crucial importance in the establishment and preservation of Rights of Way. Mrs. Heather Neil has been co-opted as a member of the subcommittee.

BEST KEPT GARDEN COMPETITION Cllr. Mee reported that plans were in hand. There would be a competition for the best kept garden, (not necessarily flowers), and a children's competition, the prizes being presented at the Fete in June. Judging would take place the previous week. Cllr. Mee stated that his company would present a trophy. The judges had not yet been chosen.

ROAD WARNING SIGNS Sir Alan Smith reported that the Roads Dept. of the Regional Council would be submitting a report to the Scottish Development Dept. for approval to erect Ice Warning signs in the Glen.

FINANCE The secretary reported that an appeal had been received from the Village Hall Committee for assistance with the purchase of a marquee, which would be of considerable benefit for local events, such as the Annual Fete. D.C. Mrs. Graham advised that the District Council might be able to assist financially.

It is estimated that the cost of the marquee, (reconditioned), would be in the region of £2-£3000. The money received from the Smith Trust (£800) would be increased by the Community Council to £1000, and with the hoped-for assistance from the District Council, and village efforts, it was hoped that the money would be raised.

Other business discussed at the meeting included the Glenfarg Folk Festival, Crime Prevention Panel, British Gas in the village, hedge trimming, and the unmade road in the village car park.

Councillors retiring at the end of their 3 year term are Mrs. Thompson, Mr. Millar and Mr. Lindsay, none of whom are seeking re-election. The last date for returning nomination forms is 28 March 1990. In the event of there being a greater number of nominations than that required to fill the three vacancies, an election will be held in the Village Hall on Thursday 19 April.

There being no further business the Chairman closed the meeting at 9.45pm.

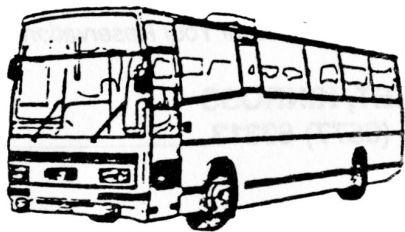

VISITS AND VISITORS

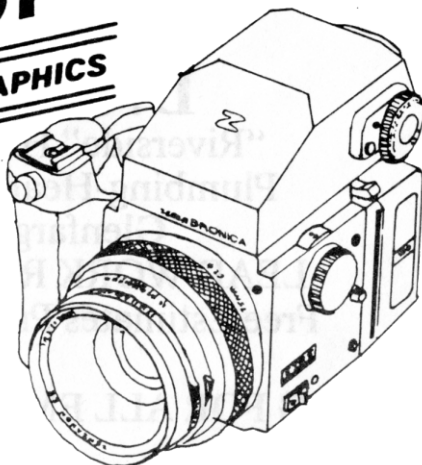

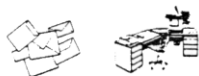

SAFETY TIPS FOR TEENAGERS

Girls in particular, but boys as well, can find themselves at risk, whether working at a part-time job or out in the evening. So try to follow these basic guidelines.

Be sure your parents always know where you are and how to contact you. If possible, go out with friends and return home with them.

If you do go out alone, arrange transport to and from the place to which you are going - with a relative, friend, or by cab - and confirm arrangements for your return journey before you set off.

If your arranged transport fails to arrive and you can see that you will be left on your own, use the telephone to make other arrangements, and ask to stay until transport arrives.

Do not accept a lift from someone you have just met.

When babysitting, always make sure you have a contact number for the child's parents, so you can reach them urgently if required. Ask telephone callers to ring back; do not tell them that you are alone.

When working a paper round, politely refuse lifts, or invitations into strangers' homes.

Wherever you are, be aware of how to make an emergency call, and the quickest way out to safety.

When finding casual work, such as babysitting, be careful about answering advertisements. Try to go with a parent or friend on the first day.

MESSAGE TO PARENTS If your teenage son or daughter wants to go out for the evening, check what transport arrangements have been made. If necessary take them and bring them back. It may be inconvenient, but it will be worth it for peace of mind, and their safety.

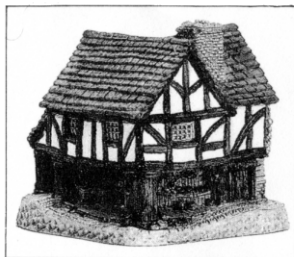

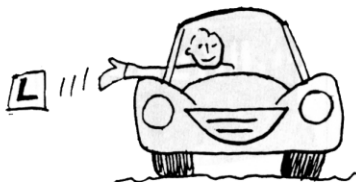
