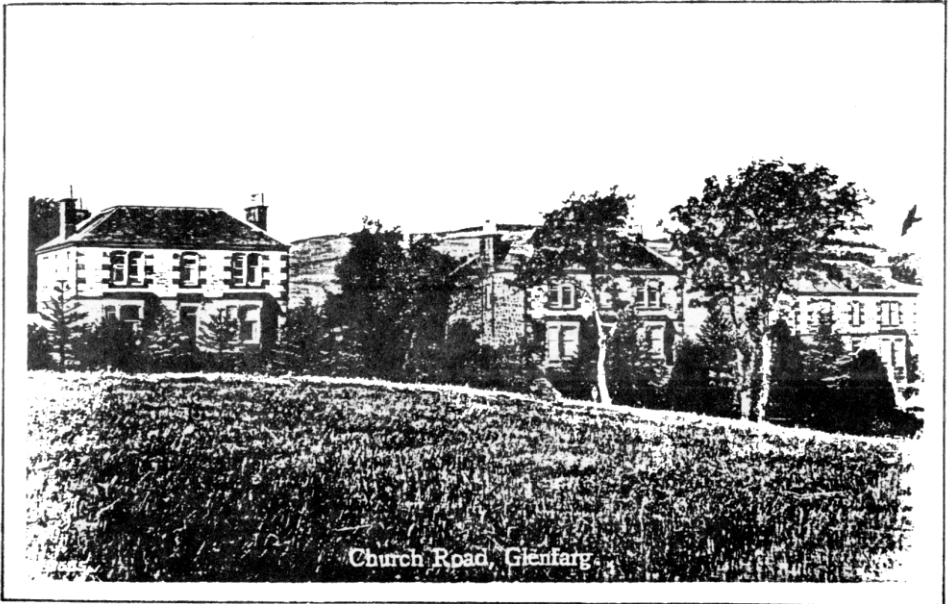

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Extract from the minutes of the Community Council meeting held in the Village Hall on 7 May 1990:

Opening the meeting, Mr. J.M. Lindsay welcomed the newly-elected councillors, and congratulated Mrs. Lena Graham, District Councillor, on her recent election as Tayside Regional Councillor.

The meeting then proceeded to item 1 on the agenda - the election of a new Chairman. After a proposal by Cllr. Brough, seconded by Cllr. Ross, Cllr. John Sinclair was unanimously elected Chairman, and took over the chair from Mr. Lindsay. The secretary expressed the thanks and appreciation of the Council members for Mr. Lindsay's work as Chairman over the last ten years, an expression which was endorsed with acclamation by those present. Cllr. Drysdale was re-elected as Secretary, and Cllr. Gent elected Treasurer - both unanimously.

The Secretary reported that he had received letters from two residents, concerning the recent C.O election. The first question referred to the refusal to issue a new ballot paper to replace a spoiled one. The Secretary stated that he thought he had adopted the correct procedure, and pointed out that the

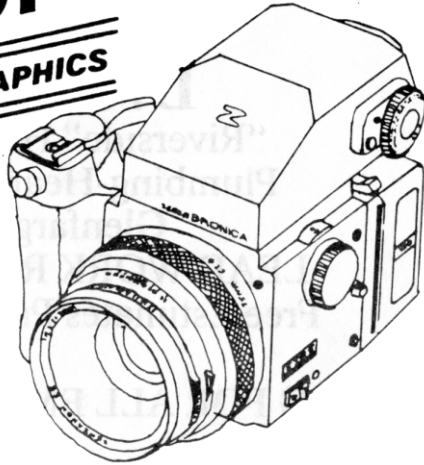

outcome of the election had not been affected. The second question concerned the composition of the Council. Although the constitution allows for 12 Councillors, it was explained that at present the Council feels that the Village is adequately represented by 10, the remaining two places being reserved to allow for co-option if necessary. The third question concerned absentee voting, and Cllr. Mee was told by the Secretary that there is no provision in the present constitution for proxy voting. These matters will be discussed at a later meeting of the Council.

The meeting then discussed the possible purchase of a second-hand marquee, the District Council having promised half the purchase price, up to a maximum of £1500. It was agreed that Cllrs. Brough and Mee should investigate this matter, with the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer being authorised to commit the Council to such expenditure as they considered appropriate.

RIGHTS OF WAY Mrs. Thompson, on behalf of the sub-committee, reported that they hoped the map/leaflets would be available shortly.

SCHOOL FUND Mr. R. Millar, the retiring Treasurer, reported that he had received £70.66 as interest on the bond held by the Council. It was agreed that the Council should increase that sum to £140 for the School Prize Fund this year.

HAND RAIL FOR CHURCH BRAE The Secretary reported that Mr. H. Marland, the owner of the adjoining property, was now unable to give unqualified consent to the fixing of the rail to his boundary wall.

TREES AND BRUSHWOOD IN THE GLEN The Scottish Development Dept. and local landowners were to be approached again about the danger of many dead trees between Main Street and the motorway, and the brushwood which littered much of the Glen following earlier tree surgery.

Other items mentioned were misuse of the skip (see separate letter), and black and white sketches of the village, by local artist Jim Douglas. These would be used in the production of post cards and full size prints, which could be of interest to visitors to, and exiles from Glenfarg.

Tributes were paid to the retiring Chairman, Mr. J.M. Lindsay, and the retiring Treasurer Mr. R. Millar.

Dear Madam,

" May I, on behalf of the Community Council, make an appeal through the medium of the Newsletter, to all residents of Glenfarg and the surrounding area, regarding the use of the skip. The Council regularly receives complaints from the residents of the houses in Greenbank Crescent, and nearby, about the amount of rubbish and paper which is blown from the skip into their gardens and houses - and their complaints are fully justified. Although the skip is emptied twice, and sometimes thrice each week, it is filled up again very rapidly. The position is aggravated by the fact that certain people misuse it by dumping unwanted household furniture and other bulky items in the skip. Such items take up space which should be available for genuine rubbish, and they should not be there at all. Recently we have observed a three-piece suite and a collection of mattresses dumped in the skip. If any resident wishes to dispose of such bulky items, all that is necessary is to telephone the District Council Cleansing Department at Perth 39911, and they will arrange to collect the unwanted items free of charge. Now, as to refuse and garden rubbish, please see that it is securely bagged or boxed, so that the contents will not be blown out of the skip into neighbouring gardens and houses. DO NOT EMPTY LOOSE PAPER AND LOOSE RUBBISH INTO THE SKIP. Above all, if the skip is already full when you arrive with your bags of rubbish, please do not leave them lying or stacked beside the skip. Take them back home and bring them back again once the skip has been emptied.

The skip is there for the convenience of the village as a whole, and should be used with consideration for the people who live closeby.

Finally, I would like to make the point that causing or creating litter is an offence. As far as I am aware, no one in Glenfarg has ever been prosecuted for this offence - but there is always a first time!"

CRIME PREVENTION

Use the Post Code to mark your valuables

Thieves look for portable, high value, easily saleable goods, like TVs, video recorders, hi-fi equipment, home computers, cameras, jewellery, silverware and antiques.

One excellent way to protect items is to mark them with an indelible identification showing your postcode, the number of your house or flat, or the first two letters of its name. The marking makes it harder for a thief to sell your property to a dealer, and easier for the Police to return the property if it is found.

Keep a list of the serial numbers of your TV, video and hi-fi equipment. The numbers will be useful if you have to make an insurance claim. To help Police identify items such as silverware, jewellery and antiques which cannot be easily marked, take colour photographs of them.

BICYCLES

Over 100,000 cycles are stolen every year. They are a popular target with thieves because they can be easily sold. They should be locked every time they are left in the street, even if you are just popping into a shop. Mark the frame with your postcode; it will help the Police return it to you if it is recovered. Many Police Stations offer free bike postcoding. Always lock your bike to something immovable like a railing or a lamp post. Try to arrange it so that the lock is attached to the frame and one of the wheels. If you have quick release wheels, (common on racers) take off the front wheel and lock it to the frame and back wheel.
