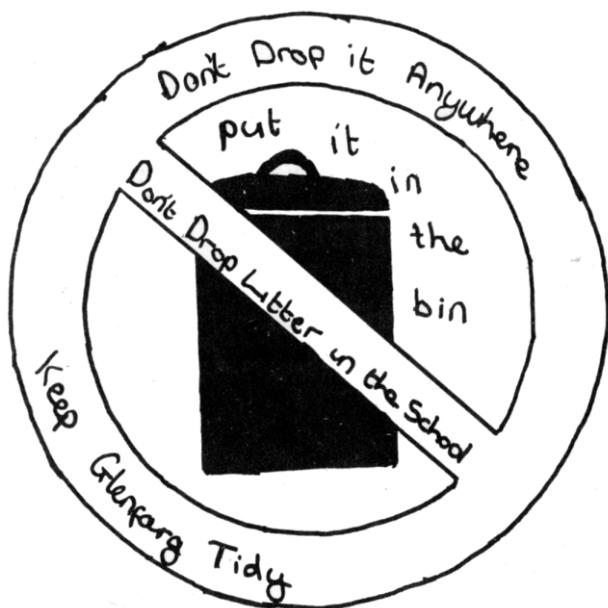

COMMUNFI'Y COUNCIL

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The A.G.M. was held on Monday 25 March, and Cllr. Drysdale was asked by the Council to take the chair, in the absence of an elected Chairman. The Chairman's and Treasurer's reports were delivered, after which the office bearers were elected. Cllr. McFarlane was elected Chairman, with Cllrs. Drysdale and Gent remaining as Secretary and Treasurer resp.

The Council expressed its thanks to, and appreciation of the work carried out on the audit of the financial statements by, Mr.J.F.Carswell, CA, who was re-appointed Honorary Auditor for the coming year.

The Chairman explained that the retiring Councillors were not seeking re-election. The previous elected Chairman had resigned in January, and the Council had agreed to bring its membership up to its permitted quota of twelve Councillors by 1993. There are, therefore, four vacanciesto be filled this year. Six nominations had been received, consequently an election will be held on Thursday 18 April 1991.

EXTRACT FROM THE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

(In the absence of the elected Chairman. Cllr. Drysdale prepared and delivered the Chairman's report.)

Our Chairman, Mr. John Sinclair, felt it necessary to give up all his community activities for reasons of ill health We appreciate the interest Mr. Sinclair has taken in the affairs of Glenfarg, and we wish him a speedy return to good health.

Much of the Council's tin has been taken up on matters affecting the quality of life in Glenfarg They are all detailed in the minutes of the Council's meetings, which are available to the public at Glenfarg Post Office, and need no repetition here.

At the beginning of the period under review, the proposed conversion of Arrgask Farm to a stud farm was a live issue. It has now receded somewhat into the background, but it may become live again, and your Council is keeping a watch on it. A proposal by A.J.Stephen Ltd. to develop land at the north end of Main Street was eventually rejected by the District Council a public meeting was held to try to ascertain the views of residents on the future development of Glenfarg. The general conclusion was that large scale development was unwelcome and that, as far as possible, new housing should be confined to infill. We have been expecting to receive a copy of the Perth Area Local Plan for the next five years, but this has not yet been received. We did, however, receive a copy of the Rural Housing "Guidelines" issued by the Director of Planning of PKDC the innocuously named "Guidelines" in fact contained the stated threat that unless the design of proposed rural housing conformed to the preconceived notions of the Planning Department, planning permission would be withheld. Such an attitude is totally unacceptable, and we have made appropriate representation to the Director of Planning. It is interesting to note that a similar representation was subsequently made by the newly-formed Kinross-shire Civic Trust, which endorsed many of the points we have already made.

The Kinross-shire Civic Trust was established during the year We support the objects of the Trust, and we have joined it as a Society Member. It is hoped that Glenfarg residents will demonstrate their interest in the environment by becoming individual or family members of the trust.

In November we were made aware of the proposed review of electoral boundaries by Tayside Regional Council for submission to the Local Boundary Commission for Scotland. To the astonishment of your Council,....and all Glenfarg residents, it transpired that theproposals included the proposal to sever Glenfarg from its natural association with Milnathort and Kinross, and to associate it with Methven and Strathearn in a new electoral area. We made appropriate representations supported by our M.P. and our District and Regional Councillor Even so the matter is now in the hands of the Boundary Commission. There will, however, be a further opportunity to make representation to that body when it publishes its provisional proposals.

For some years now it has become apparent that the constitution of the Community Council, which dated from 1977, contained a number of anomalies, and required updating. The opportunity was taken, therefore, to revise the constitution, and a new constitution was adopted at the Council's meeting on 4 March, 1991. The new constitution is now with Perth and Kinross District Council for ratification.

..... your Council took the opportunity to purchase a marquee (which) is now available for hire to local organisations and persons, and it is hoped that they will take advantage of this facility.

..... I will conclude by expressing the Council's thanks to, and appreciation of the support we have received from, our District Councillor, Mrs. Lena Graham.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The following is an extract of the minutes of the Community Council meeting held on Monday 6 May 1991.

The Chairman opened the meeting by welcoming newly-elected Councillors C.W.Murison, A.S.Smith, Mrs.J.Stronach and Mrs.M.Swan.

MARQUEE The Chairman outlined the position relating to the hire of the marquee. After discussion it was agreed that:

- a. and the Council set a rate of hire each year.
- b. a rate of £50 for a period of 72 hours or part thereof be the hire rate for 1991.
- c. the hirer is responsible for the collection, erection and return of the marquee in a clean, dry and undamaged condition.
- d. if it is found that it requires any attention, the cost of such will be charged to the hirer.
- e. the hirer is responsible for the proper insurance of the marquee

UNAUTHORISED TIP - DUNCRIEVIE

- a. the Council did not object to the siting and habitation of the caravan provided that the surroundings were maintained in a clean and tidy condition
 - b. the clearing of the waste material in the tip was beyond the capacity of the Council to undertake
- The Secretary was requested to refer the matter back to the Dept. of Environmental Health.

UNAUTHORISED TIP ON HILLSIDE... The Council's attention was drawn to the existence of another tip....which is located on the hillside above the disused quarry and adjacent to Carmore Farm. The Secretary undertook to notify the Dept. of Environmental Health...

GLENFARG CRICKET CLUB A letter had been received from the Secretary of Glenfarg Cricket Club to thank the Council for its donation, at the same time regretting that the Club was not yet sufficiently organised to be able to undertake the clean-up of the area. It was agreed that the invitation to the Club be extended until such time as it was able to do so.

REVIEW OF ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES The Chairman reported that the Provisional Proposals of the Local Government Boundary Commission had not acceded to the Community Councils representations

It was agreed that the Secretary make further representations to the Boundary Commission.

TREASURER'S REPORT Cllr. Gent mentioned that the sale of notelets had slowed down considerably, and the Chairman urged residents to support the Council by continuing to purchase these notelets for their private correspondence.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT The following matters were discussed:

- a. Perth Area Local Plan
- b. Proposed construction of house and garage at Church Brae for Mr. & Mrs. Mattson. The Council had supported objections by residents of Lomond Bank to the proposed building.
- c. Coalyard site - The Council welcomed the proposed development of the coalyard site by Mr. Lascelles. (see later article)
- d. Proposed construction of a bungalow by G.S. Brown Construction Ltd. for Mrs.J.S.Deae at Shandea, Duncrievie Road. There was considerable discussion on this proposal. The proposal involves felling a number of trees and from information brought to the notice of the Council, it would appear that the proposal is simply the first step towards an extended development of the Shandea plot. A number of residents voiced their objections and the Council...instructed the Secretary to lodge a formal objection with the Director of Planning.
- e. Proposed infill of land at Binn Farm. The Council deferred further discussion pending further information from Cllr. Mrs. Graham.

PUBLICITY Interest was expressed in the possible reproduction of historic view of Glenfarg, either in postcard or booklet form.

HAZARDS Concern was expressed by Cllr. Mrs. Wood and others at the dangerous antics of children on cycles, especially in the area of the footpath leading from Ashgrove to Ladeside, and the occasional use of the footpath by riders on horseback. It was agreed to keep this matter under review.

ARNGASK CHURCH

NEW ORGAN At the April Communion Service the new organ was dedicated by Rev. Kenneth Anderson. After the dedication Mr. Anderson made special mention of the inscribed plaque on the organ, which acknowledged legacies from the late Miss Isobel Deans, and from the late Mrs. E. Brunton, in memory of her husband, William, who had been Session Clerk of Arngask Church for many years.

ART EXHIBITION In order to help the Church funds Mr. George Drysdale has arranged for an art exhibition, by local artists, to be held in the Church Hall. As there will be considerable work involved in setting up this exhibition, we trust that it will be well supported. (See following article)

CHURCH CLEANING For the past year Church cleaning has been carried out on a monthly basis by volunteers from the congregation, and an excellent contribution to the work of the Church they have been making. Several of the regular group, however, have now left the district, and others, for various reasons, have been unable to continue, so we are making an appeal for additional helpers. If this is a way in which you would like to help the Church, please get in touch with Mr. Ross.

It is interesting to note that there were no voluntary cleaners at the "Auld Kirk" at Arngask in 1821, after the erection of the galleries at a cost of £94. Two women had to be engaged to do the cleaning, for which they were paid one shilling a day, helped by a girl whose pay was eight pence a day.

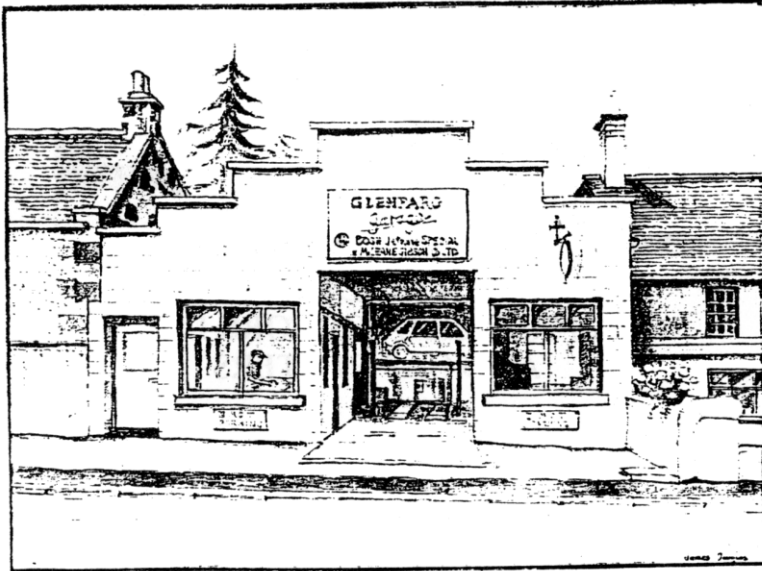

SWIMMING POOL AT BOUNTREE

The floor has now been lifted for the summer and hopefully, by the time you read this, the water will actually be warm. are very welcome to use the pool - please sign in if you have been swimming. Do remember that there is NO SUPERVISION - and there may even be no-one on the premises, so children must be supervised.

Please be sure to put the plastic cover back - it helps to keep the heat in the water. There is no charge, but a box is available for donations towards heating costs. It would be nice to see more ladies using the pool during the day, when the children are at school, and the pool rarely used.

CHARITY GARDEN OPENING

The Bank House garden was open on the afternoon of Sunday 12 May in aid of Scotland's Garden Scheme. Under this scheme 60% of the takings are split between Scottish nursing charities and the National Trust for Scotland, with the other 40% going to a charity of the garden owner's choice. This year we are giving our portion to the National Centre for Organic Gardening. This is a splendid organisation at Ryton, near Coventry, which for many years was a solitary voice preaching the benefits of organic methods and the dangers of chemicals; now, of course, they are in great demand as the green movement gathers strength.

154 people came, and we made just over £300 from entrance money and the plant stall. The weather was only moderate, and rain elsewhere locally may have reduced numbers somewhat. This is the first time we have opened in May, when the tunnel of apple trees should have been in full blossom, but wasn't because of the late season. The tulips were much admired, however, as was the new planting across the road.

We are opening a second time this year - Sunday 28 July - and then not at all next year. Do care and support us then if you can, and any gifts of plants for the plant stall would be most welcome nearer the time.

COALYARD SITE

The field, and former coalyard in the middle of the village have recently been acquired by us, and we are taking this opportunity of letting everyone know what is planned for this area. You may remember that the previous owners wanted to build houses over it all.

We intend to plant ornamental trees and shrubs on most of it, and make it into a really attractive little park-like area. It will be rough-mown for the most part, but with close-mown paths winding among the trees. The shed in the coalyard will come down, and that part will be bulldozed and graded with topsoil.

It is our intention and hope (subject to being able to make satisfactory arrangements about public liability) that this whole area will be open for everyone in the village to enjoy whenever they wish. There will be a bridge across the burn from the field to the new garden we have made opposite our house, which, as announced in the last newsletter, is also open to everyone. The two in combination should help to enhance Glenfarg, and make it a rather special village for this part of Scotland.

The lower part of the coalyard will probably have a small development of perhaps 3 or 4 old people's homes on it, and the intention is that this should incorporate the derelict strip of land there too. We are in discussions with Perth District Council about all this.

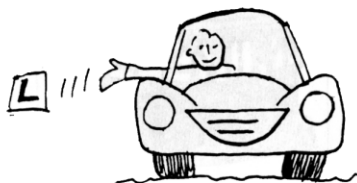

Institute in 1936, with Mr. Shorthouse as President, and Jock Millar as Secretary. It was in abeyance during the war, and when he returned he found Poles in Folda, which I think was his home at that time. He, therefore, stayed in the loft, and was given food by Mary Stewart (Stewart Smith's Mum). The club moved to the loft for a time, but eventually had to close, because there were no toilet facilities, and the floor was not strong enough for dancing. A Welcome Home Committee was formed, and gave money to the men returning from the war. Each of these men then donated a sum of money to be used as a prize for the most popular boy and girl in the Primary School - hence the Corbett Memorial Prize. Brigadier Cameron also phoned, on the subject of General Marindin, who owned Fordel and was in the Black Watch. He was very keen on sport, and there are a number of Marindin Trophies, for various sports, in the Regiment, perhaps explaining why he was keen to donate land for football. From Mr. Reid came the information that the Golf Club came to an end in 1925, when General Marindin wanted his land back. I also received a very interesting letter from Mr. Wylie, and this follows in its entirety.

GLENFARG SOCIAL CLUB (PART II)

This club originated in 1920 as an outcome of World War I. It was first a Red Triangle Club under the Y.M.C.A., but, in 1923, became the Social Club.

The article in the April issue of the Newsletter traced its history up until 1943, when the minutes of the club suddenly ceased. Let us now consider the possible reason for this.

It was not likely to be financial, as at the beginning of World War II in 1939, the Public Hall was taken over as a flour store, with the result that dances and whist drives were largely held in the social club loft. Although these functions would be mostly for wartime charities, there would be some functions for club funds. Indeed, in the winter of 1942-43 there was a free night for members. Unfortunately it was billed as a "Pie and Porter" night, and owing to the "no alcohol rule" in the club, caused some controversy in the village, which quickly subsided when the night produced nothing more deadly than bottles of lemonade and a supply of McGlashan's pies.

Glenfarg at this time was very small, consisting of only about 100 houses. There were only two Council houses. The area of Greenbank Road and Greenbank Crescent was still at this time Mollison's market garden. Similarly there were no houses in Hayfield Road, Lomond Bank or the Dreit Estate.

The most likely reason for the club being at a low ebb is lack of members, as out of this small village all men between 18 and 40 would have been liable for military service. Many of the members, or potential members, would be in the forces. The village had already suffered, with Bobby Hutcheson killed in the evacuation of France, Willie Millar killed in North Africa, Russell Millar and David Wilkie shot down and killed over Germany, and Morris Tedcastle dead at Walcheren. Bob Millar had been taken prisoner in Greece, George Buchan had been shot down and was a prisoner in Germany, Jim Brunton and Bob Bell were prisoners of the Japanese. Those still soldiering on would be dispersed in the various theatres of war. Of those left at home they would have, after their work, Home Guard or Civil Defence duties. Members at this time would be widely dispersed.

Suddenly, however, it was VE Day: then VJ Day, and gradually the servicemen were demobbed, until by the autumn of 1946 everyone was home, and there was talk of reviving the Social Club.

Permission was obtained to use the Guide Hut as premises. This was an ex-Army hut, which had been erected in the 1930s in what is now the front garden of Mr. & Mrs. Alex Black's house at Main Street. A reconditioned billiard table was purchased, and all was set for opening early in 1947. However, before things could get properly under way, the heaviest and longest snowstorm in living memory hit Glenfarg. Successive falls of snow came day after day, and eventually the sheer weight of snow became too much for the roof of the elderly Guide Hut, and it collapsed.

The hut was wrecked and the newly purchased billiard table ruined.

No further attempts were made to revive the Social Club.

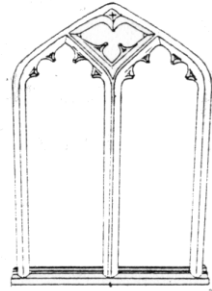

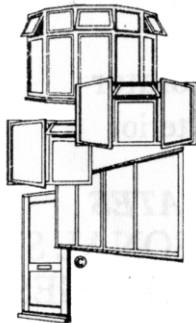

RACHEL HELPING ROMAINIAN ORPHANS

In her letters from Romania, Rachel Sinclair, younger daughter of John and Dorothy Sinclair, describes the appalling conditions in which thousands of orphan children have to live, in a country which is tackling the uphill task of improving the quality of life for its citizens after 50 years of the most oppressive Communist regime.

Rachel, a physiotherapist, is a member of a team of seven located in Pietra Meamt in the Carpathian Mountain region. During their three months service in Romania they are based in the "posh"-sounding Hotel Pietricia, but they had to take all their own medicines, toiletries and many other "essentials" including light bulbs.

In a country which is blessed with an excellent climate and some of the richest land in Europe, Rachel says that fresh fruit and vegetables are scarce, but it is the conditions in the orphanages which western volunteers find so depressing. "Toiletting and feeding are the most shocking times of the day. Clothes and bedding are virtually non-existent. Nappies consist of a rag between the legs and tied round the mist. When at meals the babies' noses are held while milk is poured down their throats."

Rachel concludes - "There is still a lot to be done, but I feel I am helping by showing how to treat physically handicapped children, but obviously all that will take time, and support from the west will be required for many, many years"

Her stint in Romania meant that Rachel missed her brother David's wedding to Bridget Pilkington in Highclere, Hampshire on 27 April. After a two hour delay she did get through to the newlyweds with congratulations, and to tell them to watch out for her appearance on the Blue Peter programme on 13 May. Rachel is full of praise for the generosity of so many children in Britain to help the less fortunate in Romania.
