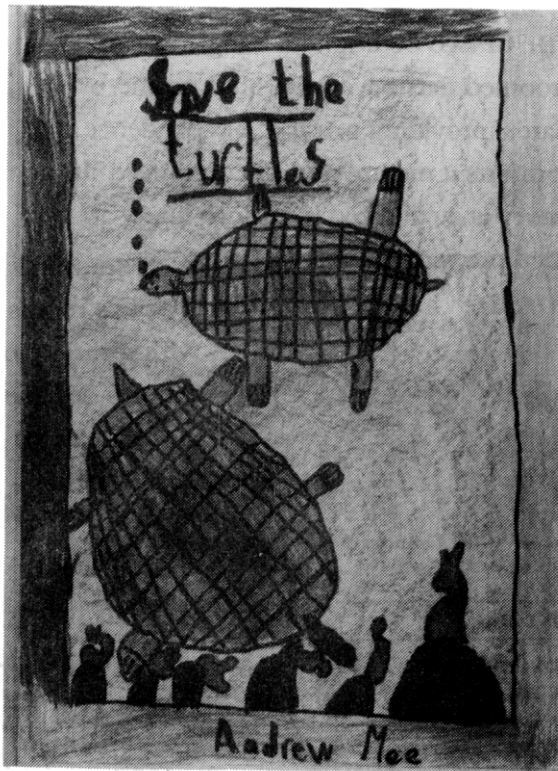

EDITORIAL

Summer is approaching rapidly now, at least as far as the gardens are concerned, but no-one appears to have told the weather, which at the time of writing is still decidedly chilly. As soon as the sun comes out the grass and weeds manage to grow prolifically, while plants always seem to need more encouragement.

The historical items in the newsletter have certainly aroused a good deal of interest, which is very pleasing, and I have been fortunate to meet Mr. Bob Bell and Mr. Bob Elder recently. The former you will recognise as the author of the articles about the Major and the Dominie, and he has promised to keep us supplied with more of his memories. We had a very interesting conversation about Glenfarg and its residents in the old days, and Mr. Bell said that he hadn't known where I lived, as he remembered the house as Tennessee. I knew that it had, at one time, borne that name, and Mr. Bell and I would both be interested to hear if anyone knows how and why it was changed.

Mr. Elder was prompted to contact me by the references in the Community Council report to the old railway bridge which is now for sale, and I include a resume of what he told me after the Community Council report.

It is not editorial policy to publish anonymous letters, especially when they contain words not entirely appropriate to the Village Newsletter, although the wishes of anyone wanting their name to be withheld would be respected. The letter to which I refer, however, deserves a mention, dealing as it does with the familiar problem of dog-fouling in the village. As the writer, who signs him/herself "An animal lover" points out, it is not the dogs, but their owners, who are to blame.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

There follows an extract of the minute of the meeting held on Monday 4 May, 1992.

Six members of the public were present, as well as, by invitation, Cllr. Mrs. Lena Graham, Insp. John Mackay (Tayside Police) and Mr. Gordon Macfarlane (PKDC Planning Department).

COMMUNITY POLICING Insp. Mackay described the measures in hand to maintain regular liaison between the Police, the community and the Community Council, so that any matters of concern may be dealt with at local level. He emphasised that the Police are always available for assistance and consultation regarding the prevention of crime in the area, pointing out the advantages of Neighbourhood Watch schemes and domestic alarms. Answering questions, Insp. Mackay stated that the Police had successfully countered the recent instances of thefts from motor vehicles in Glenfarg, but he again emphasised the necessity for individual householders to ensure the security of their own property.

TREASURER'S REPORT Cllr. Gent reported that the Council's funds....stood at £2388, which included a recovery of £40 advertising revenue outstanding at 31 December 1991. He informed the meeting that the 1992 grant from PKDC would be £227 Some discussion followed on the amount of the Council's donation towards the Primary School's prizes, and it was agreed to maintain the donation at £140 this year.

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT AT THE NORTH END OF MAIN STREET The Secretary read the exchange of correspondence with the Director of Planning, PKDC, on the subject of the District Council's volte face on the decision previously taken to refuse planning permission to A.& J.Stephen Ltd. for the construction of 19 houses at the north end of Main Street Mr. Gordon Macfarlane, a senior planning officer of PKDC, explained to the meeting the circumstances which led to the District Council's reversal of its previous decision. There was a prolonged discussion of various aspects of the proposed development, in particular of the District Council's apparent disregard of the views held by Glenfarg residents and expressed by the Community Council. Further criticism of the draft Perth Area Local Plan was voiced by the Chairman concerning the inclusion in the draft Plan

of three areas in Glenfarg as being suitable for housing development, when one area was unsuitable because of constant flooding, the second was not even offered for sale by the owner, and in the case of the third area, the District Council had already refused Planning Permission. It seemed, stated the Chairman, that there was no co-ordination in the District Council between the Planning Committee, the Planning Control Committee and the officials of the Planning Department. Mr. Gordon Macfarlane stated that objections to proposed development must be valid planning objections to have any effect.

RECYCLING FACILITIES in accordance with PKDC's policy of providing recycling facilities for public use it was proposed to provide such a facility in Glenfarg. The Council agreed that there is insufficient space at the site of the refuse skip to be able to accommodate the proposed facility. Mrs. J. McDonald stated that such a facility would conflict with the recycling arrangements which she had instituted and that the charity which benefits from these arrangements would suffer. Mrs. McDonald would discuss the matter with Mr. J. Ferguson, the Recycling Officer at PKDC, and let the Council know the outcome of these discussions.

PROPOSED ADDITIONAL LINK OVER THE RIVER FORTH

The following is taken from the letter submitted to the Scottish Office about the proposal to construct another fixed link across the Forth.

The document supplied was made available to the public for the month of April, and was discussed at the last meeting of the Community Council on 4th May, 1992. One written submission was received, suggesting that the project be abandoned on environmental and ecological grounds. There were no objections voiced at the Community Council meeting. We found the document to be extremely thorough and informative on both rail and road usage. We wish to comment on both, in historical order.

The Forth Railway Bridge has been a monument to the quality of British civil engineering for over a century. Regrettably only 200 train movements occur

daily, about once every quarter of an hour in each direction. This infrequent usage is a pity when one considers the cost of its construction, and is a cause of the dreadful overcrowding that occurs on the trains, especially at rush hour time. The document explained why the trains could not be increased in size, however an increase in frequency would not only reduce the overcrowding but might encourage more road users to travel by train.

This constraint is caused mainly by the lack of room at Waverley station to accommodate more frequent trains, which is difficult to resolve due to the geographical location of the station. If more through platforms were built (unfortunately through the present travel centre!) then trains could ply their way from North Berwick, through Edinburgh and on to Fife and vice versa. This would get the trains out of Waverley, and perhaps allow a greater frequency across the bridge.

Not all travellers and commuters, however, work in the very centre of Edinburgh. Maps of the city reveal permanent way presumably served by freight traffic. If this were improved and new stations built alongside the track (as has happened in North London) then a suburban system could be instituted. Trains coming from Fife could then either serve Waverley in the centre or run around the suburban system, thereby allowing an increase in the frequency of trains across the bridge without increasing the load on Waverley station. An interchange station to allow commuters to change trains would improve the service and further encourage travel by train. Unfortunately this could not be situated at Waverley, due to the constraints on space outlined above. There may be sufficient space at Haymarket, to allow such an interchange to be constructed.

Hopefully these changes would increase the number of rail commuter journeys. Additionally, extra passengers could be encouraged to use the railway, by the construction of a "spur" to Kinross (the track bed remaining intact to date), thereby adding this important dormitory town back onto the rail network.

The Forth Road bridge has only been in existence for a quarter of the time of its rail counterpart, yet is currently being used to a capacity greater than that originally planned.

Normally traffic flows fairly well at all times of day, however, the recent roadworks on the bridge have brought considerable delays. In addition, the only dual-carriageway running between the bridge and central Edinburgh is often choked with traffic in both directions. Hopefully the planned parallel road will ease this congestion.

It is surprising that a major fixed link is not joined to the Edinburgh by-pass or to the central belt motorway system by a dedicated dual-carriageway. Perhaps this omission and the proposed parallel Queensferry road should be constructed initially before the final decision to build a second road bridge is made.

Should a second bridge be built, then congestion may be expected at the Fife Gateway, especially if drivers have to decide whether they are going to the city centre (old bridge) or the suburbs, bypass or central belt (new bridge). Invariably people will take the wrong turning, and so provision should be available for drivers to "change their mind" once over the river. This will also enable one bridge to be shut completely for essential maintenance if necessary. To this end perhaps the present toll rate of 40 pence should remain in force, even after the present bridge is "paid for" by 1994. Any monies thus collected could be put towards the new bridge, as and when it is built. Once the new bridge is open, the tolls on the two bridges should be identical, so as not to encourage traffic onto the cheaper bridge. As it would then be unfair to increase the rate of toll on the old bridge (having by that time been "paid for"), both tolls should be set at the current rate.

The Community Council wishes to thank the Scottish Office for having been granted the opportunity to take part in the discussion of the planning stages of this exciting development. We hope you find these comments useful.

FROM MR. ROBERT ELDER

Mr. Elder's grandfather, Mr. Alex. Lawrie, had managed the team who built the railway through the village, and Mr. Elder showed me the testimonials that the former had received when he applied for the position of Road Surveyor of the Western District of the County of Perth in 1894. These were from, among others, the Caledonian Railway Co.; the Resident Engineer, Glasgow Central Railway; the Office of Public works, Glasgow, and Charles Brand & Son, from whose letter I quote: "I had such confidence in his abilities and trustworthiness, that on the Firm securing the first Contract of the Glasgow District Subway, amounting to over £100,000, I appointed him to take the management of that contract, and found his method of carrying out the work, and command of his men, to be excellent. He would have as many as 300 men under his charge at one time, and a large amount of steam machinery of various kinds. I can confidently recommend him as a gentleman who would fill the situation of a Road Surveyor to the entire satisfaction of those employing him in that capacity."
