With spring, traditionally a new beginning, comes the new look for the Glenfarg Newsletter. The various reasons for the change are explained in the Community Council minutes. In many ways it is sad to be losing our distinctive format, but if this is a more economical way to produce the publication, it must be better than no Newsletter. We have not heard from several groups for quite a long time, so, mentioning no names, how about a contribution next time?

Glenfarg Community Council

The following is an extract from the minutes of the Community Council meeting held on Monday 6 March, at which 6 members of the public were present.

TREASURER'S REPORT A letter of thanks from Mrs. Webb on behalf of Glenfarg Playgroup was read out, following a donation towards funds.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION SERVICE At the invitation of the Chairman the Local Authority Community Education Worker responsible for the area addressed the meeting on the subject of the various forms of grant aid which are available to both adult and youth groups, village hall projects, training etc. She went on to inform those present of the drop-in centre for 14 - 19 year olds in the village (operating in the Village Hall on Thursday evenings 3pm - 10pm), where they have an opportunity to play music and talk together, and of their joint project with similar groups in Milnathort and Kinross to buy and renovate a bus, which would become their permanent centre. Any help and advice which adults in the village might be able to give would be greatly appreciated. The Chairman, on behalf of those present, expressed his delight at the project, and asked that the young people be encouraged to come to a Community Council meeting to put their case: a warm welcome would be extended to them.

GLENFARG NEWSLETTER The Chairman reminded those present of the financial crisis facing the newsletter as a result of the non-payment of advertising fees. The Chairman reported that the current format of the newsletter is, in fact, the most expensive to produce, and, following discussion, it was decided to experiment with A4 format, which would be cheaper and provide more space. He expressed his thanks on behalf of the Community Council to Mrs. Macpherson for her work as Editor.

COUNCIL HOUSE HEATING The Secretary reported that, thanks to the intervention of District Councillor Ramage, the decision to remove the back boilers from the open fires had now been reversed.

UNADOPTED ROAD ADJACENT TO ARNGASK SCHOOL The Secretary reported that, after a lengthy interval, a reply had now been received from the Regional Director of Roads, intimating that, contrary to what that Department had written in 1991, this road was apparently not the responsibility of the Region, but rather of the District. The Secretary voiced disquiet at the amount of time which had been wasted, and

stated that a letter had now been sent to the District Council requesting that the matter be given attention as soon as possible.

ARNGASK PRIMARY SCHOOL The Chairman gave a brief résumé of the decision taken by the Community Council last year, and informed the meeting that the School's position on the award of a Dux prize remained unchanged. The Treasurer informed the meeting that the interest on the Bond this year amounted to £39.01, and that, consequently, it would not be paid out. The question was raised as to whether the Community Council would be able to make a donation out of its own funds. The Treasurer advised that a substantial loss would be made over this financial year. Following out of its

own funds. The Treasurer advised that a substantial loss would be made over this financial year. Following a lengthy discussion it was agreed that the decision on this question should be deferred until after the accounts for this financial year have been finalised for the AGM. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING The Chairman announced that the 18th Annual General Meeting of Glenfarg Community Council would be held on Monday 27 March 1995 at 20.00h. Four vacancies will be created as a result of the retiral by rotation of Cllrs. McFarlane, Drysdale, Ross and Mrs. Ponton. Cllrs. Drysdale and Ross had indicated that they did not wish to seek re-election.

BINN LANDFILL Cllr. Curtis reported on meetings held with both NEM (operators of the site) and the Environmental Health Dept., both of whom had confirmed that there was no proposal for the dumping of any low-grade nuclear waste on the site, and that any such dumping would require an amendment to the planning consent. The local liaison group, comprising representatives of all the Community Councils affected by the site, would be coming into force in approximately two month's time. Regular checks are carried out of what is going into the tip. NEM had confirmed that visits by members of the public are welcome by arrangement.

ROWALLAN PARK Cllr. Drysdale expressed concern that the sign which had recently been erected at the main entrance to A.U. Stephen's site at the north end of the Main Street was still advertising the site as Rowallan Park, despite the CC decision to recommend that the road be called Marindin Park. The Secretary confirmed that an assurance had been given by the Local Authority Roads Dept. that Rowallan Park was purely the marketing name being used by the developer, but this would be checked.

FIRE SAFETY The Chairman informed the meeting that fire safety advice is available free of charge from Tayside Fire Brigade.

PROVISION OF BUS STOPS The Secretary informed the meeting that a letter had been received from Tayside Region asking if there was any desire on the part of residents for the provision of additional bus stops in the village. It was decided that the current number of stops was adequate.

PROVISION OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCES The Secretary had received a letter from the District Council asking for the views of the Community Council on the provision of public conveniences in the village. It was decided that none were required.

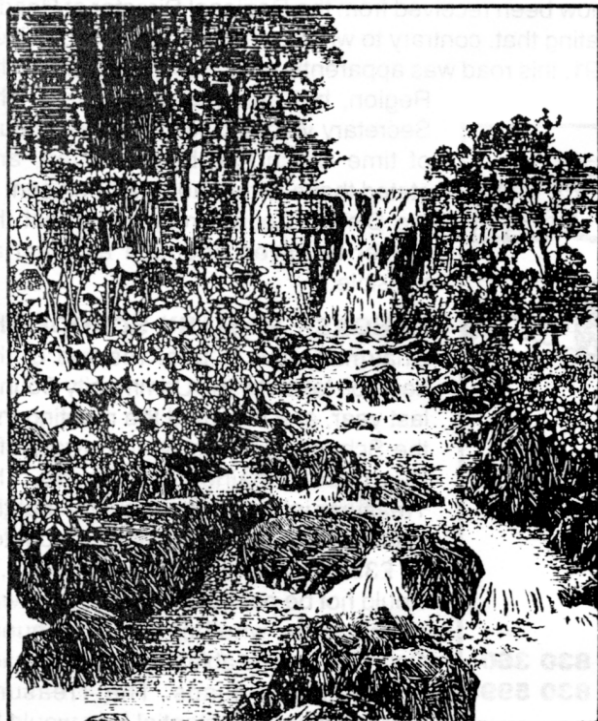

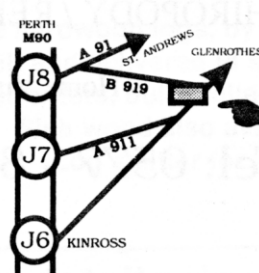

Glenfarg Community Council Annual Report 1995.

This report covers the year from 1st March 1994 to 28th February 1995.

Much of the Council's time has been taken up on matters affecting the quality of life in Glenfarg. These matters are often the minutiae of life in a small community but they are important, especially to those concerned. They are all detailed in the minutes of the Council's meetings, which are available for inspection by members of the public at Glenfarg Post Office, as well as published in edited form in the village's bimonthly newsletter, copies of which are also available at the Post Office. The newsletter is not the organ of the Community Council: instead it enjoys the benefits of an independent editorship which is especially valued.

During the past year, the newsletter has suffered from two potentially disastrous occurrences, either of which could have resulted in its closure. It may come as a surprise to readers to learn that each copy costs about one to produce. For many years the advertising revenue has just covered the cost of newsletter production, but last year we suffered a shortfall which was covered from Community Council funds. It appears that local traders are unwilling to advertise, even though we have effectively reduced the overall costs of advertising. Fortunately our printer is able to produce a newsletter using modern computer technology more efficiently, so this year we hope to produce a newsletter for approximately half the cost. This will require a change of format to A4 size which we hope you will enjoy.

Regrettably our independent editor has also suffered this year from verbal and written complaints regarding content which was theoretically outwith her control. Both

involved local traders who felt their reputations were compromised by alleged activities which were not inferred by the authors concerned, especially as one supposed activity was alleged to have occurred outside a non-existent building! It is unfortunate that some readers have become upset, and this is not the purpose of the newsletter to cause dissent, but rather to build bridges between sections of our community. In line with other local newsletters we now have to publish a disclaimer at the beginning of each volume, so as to avoid the possibility of legal action. Such is progress and we must

move in modern times!

Planning as always, has been a popular topic of discussion. The proposed housing estate at the North end of the village has been delayed due to disagreement between the developer and the Water Department regarding the size of the sewer that should be laid. One can only hope that common sense rather than greed will prevail to enable the provision of the largest sewer possible. If so, the foundation for further development may have been made, but at least the existing houses will hopefully be spared the disastrous consequences of any flooding that otherwise might have been likely. We are

also grateful that our District Councillor, Mr. Ramage, has agreed to our suggestion that this development be named after General Marindin who was a leading military personality from this village.

Our District Councillor has also been instrumental in retaining the back boilers in a number of the Council houses in the village. Many elderly villagers are grateful for central heating for the first time in their lives, but their heating bills were likely to be large due to the disconnection of their back boilers from the hot water systems, the hot water being provided by expensive immersion heaters. Fortunately, timely intervention by Mr. Ramage has saved the traditional and homely method of providing hot water at little extra cost to the householder.

to choose our Councillor for the Unitary Council, the winner of which will be made very welcome at our meetings. The proposed Unitary Council will provide all services currently provided by the District and Regional Councils, hopefully providing better value for money by reduction in duplication of services and repetitive deferment of responsibility between District and Region. One area where great savings could be made is to scrap the Planning Department, since it appears to serve no useful purpose except to consume large resources for little tangible results. Certainly within this village it appears that builders and developers can construct what they like, where they like with little fear of being hindered in their projects. Since the discussion part of the Planning process appears to be largely ignored by the Planning Committee and builders seem able to drive a coach and horses through the Planning regulations, I see no possible use or function for a Planning Department in the new Unitary Councils.

Vandalism seems to have continued unabated within the village over the past year, notwithstanding our efforts to inform the local constabulary as to trends of this antisocial behaviour. It seems that the Police now appear to be positively disinterested in this activity and so far our efforts to encourage them and local village organisations to work together to tackle this worrying problem are fruitless. As it now appears to be illegal to protect one's own property, I propose to inform the Police by letter of any criminal damage of this nature. Thus as we enter the third millennium, we resort to the communication of the previous century; progress again!

The local vandals take their name from a more noble savage race from North Germany who with other Barbarians caused the collapse of the Roman Empire [an early form of European Union with a common currency!] and heralded the commencement of the middle ages. At least they left behind their own culture of songs, music and fine jewellery. However we have more modern, middle age vandals who seem hell bent on destroying our own local customs without the benefit of any resulting legacy. The Ex-service Men's Association set up the Dux prize fund to maintain the memory of those villagers who paid the ultimate sacrifice to safeguard our essential freedom; a freedom we celebrate half a century of, this year. Their peers who survive feel that their efforts have been similarly vandalised, leaving only harsh and bitter feelings of frustration, typified by a truncated list of prize winners in our local school. Certainly they are glad that the School Board is in a position to make its own decisions about the school and its future, but I am aware that they are not happy with the actual decision taken; with its promotion of short termism, rather than the more endearing and lasting qualities of endeavour and lasting effort. In our work this year I am grateful for the support I have had from our Secretary and Treasurer and fellow Community Councillors who have all been most helpful in providing advice. Our Treasurer will be presenting the Council's financial statements and I shall not pre-empt his report. I conclude by expressing the council's thanks to, and appreciation of the support we have received from our Regional and District Councillors.

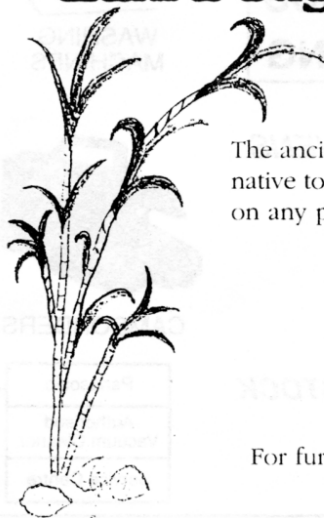
