Once again the annual ate has come and gone, and this year, as on one or two previous occasions, the question as to whether or not a fourth year, to benefit the youth of the village, should be introduced into the cycle, has, in the opinion of some people, reared its ugly head again.

Why is this suggestion received each time with such horror, as though it is the most unreasonable and preposterous idea ever? A perennial argument is that everyone benefits directly or indirectly from the three groups who regularly organise the fete. Doesn't the village benefit from its young people? Are they not the future of the village?

Perhaps it wouldn't work, although I don't think that can be assumed, but surely it is entitled to discussion. The problem is, that because the fete is organised by different groups each year, no-one has overall responsibility for it. Isn't that perhaps the role of the Community Council? As the "governing body" of the village shouldn't it take the

responsibility for at least initiating discussions between interested parties when a question is raised by villagers?

Year after year all the village organisations, not only youth ones, whether or not they are involved with the Hall, the Church or the Old Folks, work extremely hard to make the fete a success, for absolutely no reward - in fact some will not even take expenses. I would be the first to agree that we should not encourage our young people in the view that they must be rewarded for everything they do - they should be encouraged to help others for no gain, but everyone likes to be appreciated, and a balance must be achieved.

I can foresee a time when we will lose the fete, because many of those organisations that do not benefit in any way at all, will simply give up, through lack of appreciation. If the idea of a fourth year is so abhorrent, how about allowing each stallholder to keep a percentage of the takings, or,

instead of the fête as we know it, invite local organisations, and businesses both local and from further afield, to pay a fee for a stall and then keep all the proceeds? I have seen this last idea in action, and together with side shows, a raffle and an evening dance organised by the fête committee, there has been no loss of revenue.

I am the most stick-in-the-mud and opposed-to-change person I know, but sometimes change is not all bad, and views from all sides should at least be heard. Surely a Village Fete should in some way benefit the whole village?

The foregoing is my own personal opinion, and is in no way the view of the Community Council or the Newsletter. I would be very happy to publish other personal views on the subject next time.

*Minutes of a meeting of GLENFARG COMMUNITY COUNCIL held in the Church Hall, Arngask Parish Church,
Glenfarg on Monday, 3 July, 1995 at 20h00*

Present: Clir. A.G. McFarlane (Chairman)

Cllr. C.W. Murison (Hon. Treasurer), M. Curtis. J. Reid, Lady MacLean and Mrs. S. MacNeill (Hon. Secretary).

Apologies for absence were received from Cllrs. R.J. Gent, A.S. Smith

and J. Learmonth.

Four members of the public attended.

Min. No.

43/95 Minutes On a proposal by Cllr. Curtis, seconded by Cllr. Murison. the Minutes of the meeting held on 1 May, 1995 were confirmed as a correct record of the proceedings of that meeting.

44/95 Treasurers Report Cllr. Murison (Hon. Treasurer reported on the income and expenditure during the period since the last meeting.

45/95 Perth Transport Plan The Chairman read out to the meeting his suggested response on behalf of Glenfarg CC to the proposed new Transport Plan for Perth. Following discussion thereon it was agreed particular mention should be made of the current lack of coordination in connections between buses to and from Glenfarg and buses and trains departing from Perth, as well as the lack of a late evening bus back to Glenfarg from Kinross.

46/95 Rural Policy The Secretary read out to the meeting her suggested response on behalf of Glenfarg CC to the proposed White Paper on Rural Policy for Scotland. Following discussion thereon it was agreed that there should be added a call for increased confidentiality in connection with applications for grants (many people can be put off from applying if they know the award of a grant is going to be advertised in the local press), as well as a call that small businesses should not be stifled with bureaucracy.

47/95 Rural Initiatives Scotland 1995 The Chairman referred to the fact that application forms were now available from the Secretary for grants for local worthy causes.

48/95 Unitary Authorities The Chairman announced that he had received a letter from Mr Robertson. the head of the new Unitary Authority, asking for comments on the role of community councils vis-a-vis the new Unitary Authority. During discussions, it was agreed that the Authority must accept an inevitable time-lag in communications because of the infrequency and variability of community council meetings. It was agreed that communications would be greatly enhanced if representatives of the community councils could be co-opted as non-voting members of the Authority. Even 3 seats occupied by the community councils in rotation would be interesting and would enable the local CC views to be brought into debate.

49/95 Water Services The Secretary referred to a letter from the Director of Water Services which had been handed in to a number of households in the village that evening announcing that the water was to be turned off for a period or periods of up to 72 hours at a time in the near future to allow improvements to be carried out to the water mains. During discussion it was agreed that the Secretary should respond on behalf of Glenfarg CC pointing out that this proposal was unreasonable for all affected but particularly for the hotel and self-catering businesses in and around the village who might well have to claim compensation for business lost. It was, however, agreed that, once carried out, the improvements would solve the current supply problems affecting Hilton Farm and Glendy Mill and would enable the system to cope better with the additional houses being built at the north end of Main Street.

50/95 Derelict Ground The Secretary reported that negotiations were carrying on with the District Council about the cutting of the grass to be planted on the former derelict site. Cllr. Murison pointed out that stones and soil were already being dumped on the cleared site along with waste cement. Following discussion about the expense and difficulty of obtaining top-soil for the area it was agreed at the suggestion of the Chairman that the CC should apply for a Rural Initiatives grant in order to purchase top-soil and a fence.

51/95 Marquee The Secretary referred to the fact that the marquee had just recently been let out on hire at Huntingtower but that the person hiring had discovered that it would be impossible to obtain insurance if the marquee were not erected by the hirers (Glenfarg CC). The Secretary expressed the thanks of the CC to Stewart Smith (father & son), Jim McHardy, Peter Cummings and Arthur Jenkins who had kindly taken the marquee to Huntingtower, erected it there and returned some days later to take it down. Without this contribution of time and effort, the hire would not have been possible. On a proposal by Cllr. Lady McLean, seconded by the Chairman, it was agreed that the sum of £50 should be deducted from the hire fee and presented to this group of helpers as an expression of thanks. The thanks of the CC were also given to all those who helped with the erection of the marquee at the time of the village fete.

52/95 Storage Shed in Park The Secretary put forward a request made by a number of people for a replacement shed to store the marquee, chairs etc. under the one roof. Following discussions it was agreed that, as the present shed was owned by the District Council. they should be asked to replace it, failing which application could be made for a Rural Initiatives grant.

53/95 Fete Proposals The Secretary reported that there was apparently some disquiet in the village about the current arrangements for the fete and that some organisations, in particular the Scouts, would like also to benefit. The suggestion had been made that perhaps every fourth year the fete might be open to all organisations. During discussion it was pointed out that the Church, the Village Hall and the Old Folks Association all benefit the whole village. The Chairman emphasised that despite several offers made in the past by the CC to help with the organisation of the fete, these had been declined and that, if the Scouts wished to pursue this proposal, they should contact the three organisations involved direct.

54/95 Joint meeting of Community Councils The Secretary referred to a letter received from the Secretary of Kinross CC giving notice of a joint meeting of the local Community Councils to be held on 20 September. It was agreed that this matter be put on the agenda for discussion at the September meeting of Glenfarg CC.

56/95 Recycling The Secretary referred to a letter received from the District Council along with a report and copies of a questionnaire relating to a proposed recycling plan based on a kerbside household waste collection system. Copies of the report and questionnaires would be placed in the Post Office and additional copies could be obtained through the Secretary.

57/95 Binn Landfill Site The Chairman reported that the people of Abernethy are apparently unhappy with what is happening at the landfill site. alt. Curtis confirmed that he was attending a meeting on the subject the following evening.

58/95 Remembrance Day The Chairman proposed, and it was agreed, that the Treasurer should make arrangements for the purchase of a larger wreath than usual to mark the 50th anniversary of the end of the War.

59/95 Oxfam The Secretary reported on a request from the Glasgow office of Oxfam asking if the CC would organise the collection on behalf of the charity in October. It was agreed that this should not be done.

60/95 Tree Warden Scheme Mrs Judy King gave a brief presentation on the role of the tree warden and asked for a comments on and reactions to trees in the village.

There being no other relevant business, the Chairman declared the meeting closed at 21h30.

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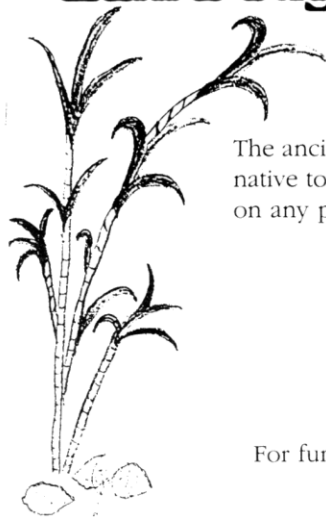
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Arngask School PTA

The Tree Warden Scheme

What is a tree warden? Well, he or she isn't what would immediately spring to mind: some fierce person in a uniform, bearing down on civilians, threatening fines! The Tree Warden Scheme was founded in southern England after the huge damage to trees caused by the two great storms. In spite of all the governmental and charitable bodies concerned with trees it was felt that there was a need for local people to be involved. The first Tree Warden Scheme in Scotland was founded by David Penman of Perth & Kinross District Council in late 1993. Although the area did not suffer so much from storms, other things like agricultural

intensification, urban sprawl, building development, disease and neglect were taking their toll. Community Councils in the region were asked to appoint people to become wardens for their communities, and training sessions were organised under the guidance of The Scottish Conservation Projects Trust based in Stirling. The first session was held in Perth in January 1994, and since then sessions have occurred about once every six weeks, in locations as far apart as Braco, Aberfeldy and Pitlochry, covering such subjects as Tree and Woodland Surveys and map making, Tree Law and Grants, History of Scottish Woodlands, Seed Collection and Propagation, and local involvement.

We are extremely lucky in Glenfarg to have such a variety of trees. Mr. Reid's postcard gives a good view. We are fortunate to have Wallace Park where the latest plantings are doing well, and Mr. & Mrs. Lascelles charming conversion of the coal yard and field right in the centre of the village. There are some lovely examples of trees in private gardens and grounds.

A lot of new planting has been done (nothing to do with me!) at Glenhead Cottage, on either side of the M90 south, at Glendy Mill, and at Rushiefaulds and Hilton of Duncreevie.

I have attended most of the training sessions, and I hope I have learned something which may be of use to the Community. I cannot be an expert, but I am able to be a sort of junction box between individuals and the experts.

Here are some questions:

Have you a favourite tree or group of trees in the area?

Would you like to see more trees, and where?

Have you any problems or concerns regarding the trees in your garden or around Glenfarg?

Is there any area you would like to see improved/developed into an amenity area?

And to landowners, is there any area you own which you would consider for nature conservation/tree or hedge planting with/without public access?

John was educated at Arngask School, Perth Academy and SAC Edinburgh, where he gained his HIND in Agriculture.

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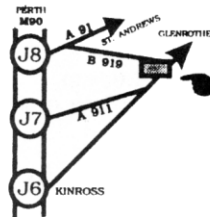
