Have Some Madeira M'Dear

I am often asked what type of cake would be most suitable for celebrating a special occasion. The answer I always give is 'Madeira cake'. And not just because I like making it! You will often find

someone who doesn't like chocolate or fruit cake but most people enjoy a traditional 'plain' cake like this one, made simply with flour, butter, sugar, eggs, milk and sometimes lemon.

The recipe for Madeira cake dates back to the 18th or 19th century. It has quite a dense texture - firm but light - and this makes it particularly good for carving into shapes Westie dogs, like wine bottles and guitars! It also keeps for up to a week giving time to hand some out to family. friends and colleagues.



So why is it called Madeira cake? Some people mistakenly think that the cake originally came from the Madeira islands. It was actually named after Madeira wine, a Portuguese wine from the islands, which was popular in England at the time that Madeira cake was first made. The wine was not used in the cake itself but it was often served along with the cake. Madeirans do produce their own traditional cake – 'bolo de mel' - but this is a dark, spicy, honey cake and so is quite different in taste and appearance.

Arngask Old Graveyard Preservation Group

Arngask Old Graveyard Preservation Group became active when the Friends of Perth and Kinross Heritage Trust disbanded, in 2015.

Prior to the disbandment, members of the Friends of PKHT Committee who had started clearing the undergrowth from the graveyard and existing derelict church at Arngask in 2014, continued their involvement in this clearance.

During this clearance an old baptismal font was uncovered along with a stone which had been built into the wall with very old cup marks on it.

This work has continued over the past year, and has been followed up, with a detailed survey of the graveyard having being carried out and all visible headstones and inscriptions on them noted and photographed and hand drawn.

This information will in due course, be available for the general public to view and will be helpful for those carrying out family research or for anyone involved in heritage or social projects.

Throughout 2015, whilst members of Arngask Old Graveyard Preservation Group (all volunteers) were active at the

graveyard they encountered many visitations from people from all over the world tracing their family ancestry.

They also had an informal visit from a group of local schoolboys from Glenfarg who showed great interest and enthusiasm in the project and wanted to partake in helping members clean some of the old gravestones. They showed a great deal of knowledge about their local community to the volunteers on that informal visit.







Arngask is a very old graveyard which has a great deal of ecclesiastical and social history attached to it. Many of the gravestones date back to the early 1600's and many have beautiful intrinsic carvings on them some of



which indicate the deceased's profession of work.

There is a grave commemorating a General Robert Bruce who fought in the Kaffir War in 1853 which had become overgrown and research has found that he was quite a colourful character who was highly thought off. There are several First World War graves includina Militarv а Cross recipient. However there are also First World War Graves that have had their headstones removed or vandalised over the years and it is difficult to ascertain at present, the identity of those soldiers.



There are sadly, many commemorative stones indicating the death of a child. Interestingly enough, some of the small head stones for these children had been placed by some of their schoolmates and teacher. Research has shown, that some of the children's graves indicate that they died of Rheumatic Fever, Heart Disease and Diphtheria.

Background research indicates that the first surviving document in relation to a church at Arngask, is dated 17th September 1281 and belonged to Cambuskenneth Abbey.

In 1527, a local landowner and heiress – Lady Margaret Barclay built a chapel within the graveyard. She and her husband Sir Andrew Murray gave an annual rent of 14 merks for the support of chaplains to sing mass in the church.

This chapel was later replaced by a second church in 1710 which was subsequently replaced by a third church in 1806 which is now abandoned and in ruins.



Located within the graveyard is a very rare and important statue which is carved out of red sandstone to the founder of the first chapel Lady Margaret Barclay.

The statue was removed to nearby Balvaird Castle when the second church was built in 1710, but was returned to the graveyard, in the latter part of the nineteenth century where it is located next to a ruinous watchhouse.

Over the years the statue has become the victim of weather erosion along with the bell- cote from the second church built in 1710.

Both the statue and bell- cote are important features of Scotland's heritage and fund-raising events are being carried out by members of Arngask Old Graveyard Preservation Group to save both the statue and bell- cote for future generations.

We are currently raising funds for a Conservation report by a stone specialist on both artefacts which is going to cost just under £700.

One of the areas where funds are being raised for this Conservation report is through two quiz sheets which have been placed in various locations in Perthshire, including the local newsagent in Glenfarg for locals or visitors to purchase.

Glenfarg Policing



Glenfarg and the surrounding area is policed by police officers stationed at Kinross Police Station. The resources servicing this area are made up of a Response Policing Team and Community Policing Team. The Community Policing Team is overseen by Sergeant Amanda Nicolson who has 17 years policing service in her capacity as Community Coordinator. Sergeant Nicolson is based from Perth Police Station and has a geographical area of responsibility taking in the whole of South Perthshire, co-ordinating the community business of the three multimember wards of Strathearn, Strathallan and Kinross-shire. Sergeant Nicolson works during office hours, Monday to Friday predominantly.

Heading up the local Community Policing Team based at Kinross Police Station is Community Sergeant Willie Hughes who has 12 years policing service. Sergeant Hughes has a community geographical area of responsibility for the whole of Kinross-shire and has a team of five Community Constables. Both Sergeant Hughes and his Constables work shifts covering 7 days a week between 0700 and 0100 hours during the week and 0700 and 0400 hours on Friday and Saturday evenings.

To contact your Community Policing Team you can phone 101 or e-mail <u>taysidekinross-shirecpt@scotland.pnn.police.uk.</u> Correspondence to this e-mail address is only viewed Monday to Friday during office hours and as such should not be used for urgent business. In an emergency the police should be contacted using the 999 system. To keep up to date with

local community safety issues local residents are encouraged to join Community Watch which the Community Policing Team along with their community safety partners use to keep the local community up to date. The web site to join Community Watch is www.pkcommunitywatch.co.uk.

Steve Whiting opened meeting outlining group objectives as indicated by GCC and public meeting. The group will not at this stage be constituted.

- 3 Current situation update A planning application for change of use & convert to 12 flats was submitted to P&KC on 4th Dec but was knocked back and currently classified as "invalid" whilst P&KC request more information.
- 4 Two selling agents of licensed premises have refused to handle sale at requested over £600k.
- 5 Financial records for Arngask Hotels Ltd and other relevant companies have been obtained via Company House. Qualified accountant help/explanations have been sought. No further action at this stage.

6 It was recorded that the hotel furniture and fittings/equipment are currently being removed from the hotel.

7 It was the unanimous belief of the group that the owner has no, or has no longer, intention to sell the hotel as a going concern.

8 GCC, on receipt of planning application notification, will pursue all aspects of objections and will provide information to the whole community for individuals to register personal or group objections.
9 Personal communications have already been sent by members of the working group to P&KC Councillors, MSPs and MP requesting support and possible meetings.

10 Future Plans - Whilst all agreed that the ideal situation was the hotel remains as a hotel, it was agreed that a back up plan should be prepared. A lengthy discussion examined requirements, possible locations, new build, conversion of/addition to existing, funding. From this discussion it was agreed that Tim Corcoran, Cath Todd and Margaret Ponton informally approach possible site owners.

11 New Build - possible locations were mentioned but would require dedicated research and design.

12 Funding - application for funds when initial plans drawn up.

13 Kate Armstrong to apply for micro grant to provide funds for expenses incurred by group e.g. hall rental, printing costs. Full recording of all expenses will be made and authorised.

14 Interim "pub" - options to be explored but in light of upcoming Christmas and New Year festivities any arrangements will be informally arranged by private individuals.

In December, my wife Alice and myself visited Houston Texas to spend Christmas with our daughter Allison and her family. About a 20 minute walk from her house is a supermarket called Wholefoods which is mainly an organic shop. Right in the middle, next to the cheese counter, the cake counter and surrounded by yoghurts and milk is a bar!

Its like an oasis for anyone who likes a beer or a glass of wine (that's all the type of drinks they sell), and, due to the closure of the Glenfarg watering hole, I arrived in Texas with a severe drouth. So whilst your partner does the shopping, or you feel the urge in the middle of your shopping, you can pull up a stool and have a wee drink! There are an impressive 19 different craft beers always on draught, plus about 10 wines (including fizz).

You need to pick your drink carefully as they ABV strength ranges from 4.5% - 14.8% and they all have the most imaginative names such as Goose Island and No Label Brewing Co. They are priced around the \$5 - \$6 mark and are well looked after. The wines are all on offer in the aisles, so you can really try before you buy. The shop trollies all have a cup holder that takes either a pint glass or if you want wine, they put it into a jam jar that fits in the cup holder so that whilst shopping you don't waste any drinking time!

Whilst sitting at the bar, you can also order hot food such as fish and chips, soup, toasties and so on, or you can go to any of the fresh food counters such as sushi, tacos, pizza, salad, soup, curry, BBQ etc., buy something, get a bar code on the box, take it to the bar where the barmaid will scan the food and add it to your bill. MATTERS ARISING:

<u>Vehicle Activated Signs</u> The installation now expected to take place in January

<u>White Lines outside Church</u> The reinstallation has been delayed due to flood work. This will be carried out at the earliest possible opportunity when the surface is dry.

<u>Repairs to wall Duncrievie Road / Wallace Park</u> The Community Payback Team are to be asked to inspect with a view to carrying out necessary repairs. *CCllr Watson*

Damage to Main Street Wall There is some disagreement between BEAR Scotland and Perth & Kinross Roads Dept about responsibility. CCIIr Watson reported that BEAR Scotland have agreed to speak to Roads Dept to settle the matter.

<u>Salt Spreader</u> Salt has been purchased and is stored with the spreader in GDIB's shed in Hayfield Road.

<u>Ladeside Junction</u> A local business had expressed concerns that the road safety measures planned for this junction may affect the entry and egress of their large vehicles. CCIIr Watson had contacted

The CC will be sent the plans. The Road Safety Officer felt that the new plans would actually make it easier for vehicles to navigate the corner.

Request for 20mph Speed Limit at Duncrievie CCIIr Watson had approached the Road Safety Department, requesting that this area be added to a trial being carried out in rural areas. This was not possible, and it had been explained that the trial was investigating the effectiveness of such measures as other research had cast doubt on its effectiveness. The CC is to be informed of the outcome of the trial. A member of the public once again expressed concerns about the safety of Duncrievie residents who were forced to walk in the road and could suffer abuse from passing motorists.

Animals in Wallace Park 12 entries in the colouring competition had been received and 2 CCIIrs decided the winner. The Community Payback Team to be advised of the colours chosen for the 4 animals. CCIIr Watson

POLICE REPORT

As no police officer was present, the report was read out by the CC Chairman. There had been reports of cold calling. 2 males were checked and warned accordingly. There had been 4 reports of theft – a red Honda quad bike, a scrap generator, a collection of power tools, one tonne of logs – all under enquiry. Following reports of a scrambler bike in Glenfarg, the bike was stopped and one male charged with offences.

PLANS FOR THE AVENUE

George Lawrie from TRACKS presented the Arngask School Travel Plan. This plan involves resurfacing and improving the drainage in The Avenue (the tree-lined avenue linking Greenbank Road near Hayfield Rd to the end of Greenbank Crescent) to make it a suitable walking / cycling route to school. He has consulted The

Avenue's owner who has agreed to work being carried out on condition that tarmac not be used. The surface will therefore be the same as the Loch Leven Trail, as it is not damaging to tree roots. It was pointed out that horses also use the path, although not at the times when school pupils would be present. Mr Lawrie said that paths must be for all and no user could be excluded.

The Avenue will still require maintenance, which will not be carried out by the owner or P&KC. The Glenfarg Paths Group should be able to carry out such maintenance as strimming and gully cleaning. Paths For All should be able to offer training and funds for equipment. Dog bins will not be allowed on The Avenue but could be requested for either end of the route. Secretary

The plan includes a link from the end of the Avenue into Greenbank Crescent – a sealed surface with solar lights. Mr Lawrie has also discussed the possibility of a 'restricted zone' in Greenbank Crescent. This would restrict cars entering the crescent at times when school children would be present – going to / from school and in the lunch hour. P&KC was in favour of a restricted zone for the whole crescent. After discussion, the CC agreed that too many residents would be badly affected by this and requested that the restricted zone be limited to the cul-de-sac off Greenbank Crescent leading to the school car park. School staff and residents with garages would still be able to gain access, but the cars of parents or those wishing to recycle would be banned at these times. A 'sleeping policeman' is planned for the entrance.

There was further discussion about pupils being encouraged to walk to school, and Mr Lawrie was of the opinion that parents may drop off children at the far end of The Avenue. This caused some concern about safety issues as the Greenbank Road / Hayfield Road junction is difficult to navigate already. Mr Lawrie to consult with the Road Safety Officer.

The school is very much in favour of all these plans, some of which will be put in place during the Easter holidays. Mr Lawrie requested that the CC ask P&KC to clear the first drain in Greenbank Road,

The owner of The Glenfarg hotel had lodged an application with P&KC for change of use and planning application for 12 flats. The CC had hosted a public meeting to discuss the situation, at which The Glenfarg Hotel Action Group was formed from volunteers in the community. 162 Comments have been sent to the Planning Department, including an objection from the Community Council. We have been informed that, as there is a listed building in the immediate vicinity, a site visit is required. This will result in the consultation period being reopened for a further 3 weeks.

A report on any other planning applications in our area has been deferred to the next meeting of the CC.

GLENFARG HOTEL ACTION GROUP FUNDING REQUEST

A Micro Grant request had been received for funding of running costs for this group, which is exploring possibilities for a social hub as previously fulfilled by the hotel. It was agreed in principal to fund necessary costs up to an overall maximum of £250. The group is to

WALLACE PARK STORAGE

The CC has considered taking over and upgrading the old changing rooms in Wallace Park as storage for fete equipment etc. CCIIr Ponton reported that she had approached P&KC and found that there is an asbestos problem. Also A & J Stephen (Builders) had offered to demolish the building at their own expense as it requires access to the electricity supply. It was therefore agreed not to oppose this.

A member of the public suggested the use of a shipping container, which could be positioned on the concrete base in the park, or a site found elsewhere. A 20ft container is believed to cost between £1.6K and £2K. It will be necessary to determine the length of storage required for the marquee.

A CCIIr has contact with A & J Stephen, and offered to sound them out on how they could help the community with this enterprise.

A list of correspondence had been circulated to community councillors prior to the meeting.

AOCB:

<u>Lights</u> A member of the public reported that the sunken lights outside the Village Hall had not been coming on in the evening when

people were walking from the car park. He was advised to contact the Hall's Property Convenor.

<u>CCIIr Horsman</u> asked if it was known what was happening with the vacant properties at the end of Greenbank Road. One property was becoming dilapidated and the measures to make it secure were falling apart. Since children pass it daily, it was felt that contact should be made with the owner to inform him of the situation. *Secretary*

It was also suggested that our local councillors could advise on whom to contact at P&KC about empty properties. *Secretary*

<u>Newsletter</u> CCIIr Watson reported that the Communication Group had met to discuss the newsletter, and had agreed not to offer delivery of copies to subscribers in future. The number of subscribers has dwindled over the years, and it was noted that the residents who subscribed seemed to be people who also visited the shop regularly. A courtesy copy of the February edition will be delivered, with a covering note making it clear that anyone unable to travel to the shop could continue to have the newsletter delivered. *CCIIr Horsman*

<u>Old Arngask Cemetery</u> The group working on restoration of this site has been raising funds for stone preservation and now has a shortfall of £250-£300. They have asked if it would be appropriate to reapply to the Lochelbank Fund that turned down their original request. To be advised that funding of survey work was not appropriate but a request for funding to carry out preservation would be supported. *CCllr Watson*

<u>Flooding</u> It was noted that several properties had experienced flooding / potential flooding recently and the community was commended on the way that it had supported those affected.
