



## Off Again - when the weather improves

Sitting here at home mulling over road maps and planning this year's motorbike trips it's hard to believe that the snow will disappear, spring is just around the corner and that summer shall arrive, albeit eventually. Once the better weather does arrive then not just me but many other motor bikers will be out and about doing what we like and that is to ride our bikes, be it for commuting or leisure. Fortunately for me I have more leisure time now and plan my trips when it suits me. I've been riding motorbikes for over 40 years and the expectation of a great bike ride anywhere in Scotland or further afield, no matter the weather, is something to be savoured and enjoyed. Scotland and Europe have such a diverse range of roads to tour on and no matter where you go, once stopped, somebody wants to talk to you about your motorbike, where



you have ridden from and where you are going.

Looking back on last year's trips brought back memories of my April 2017 foreign trip along with planning the route, where to stay overnight, what we'd like to see and coping with languages. My favourite pillion rider, Mrs RT Rider, and I have travelled throughout Europe on my motorbikes although Denmark was chosen for a break

to stay with friends in Copenhagen during April. My Danish goes as far as "Hello, Goodbye and Thank you" although not to worry because a majority of Scandinavians do speak English and you can always get by with lots of

gesticulations and laughter. Nevertheless, come April's Easter holiday, it was load up the BMW 1200cc Road Tourer (Funnily enough I had one pannier for my entire ten day wardrobe requirements whereas the top box and other



pannier were for Mrs RT Rider! Why, do ladies need all these clothes?) and off to North Shields to catch the overnight Wednesday DFDS Ferry to Ijmuden, Holland and then on to Hamburg, Germany for our Thursday night's stopover. The ferry trip offered great food, shopping, entertainment and a cosy cabin.

Following an "eat as much as you like" breakfast it was time to disembark and head through Dutch Border Control. The Dutch Border Guard, a lady, loved my Scottish accent and wished us a great trip to Copenhagen. Mrs RT Rider's comment was "Did you like her then?" "Eh, no dearest, only being friendly" – ha ha. It was dry and cool in Holland as we rode north and over the causeway (photo above). My motorbike is equipped with a few "boys toys" and being able to have Sat Nav, heated seats and grips,

cruise control at your fingertips makes for comfortable trips. Plus we have Bluetooth Intercoms on our helmets that allow Mrs RT Rider and I to chat to about the correct directions per her excellent map reading skills or anything else. Our first stop in Holland was at a typical motorway services so I guessed that despite Dutch being



spoken in the queues I'd use English and was spoken to expertly without any bother at all. More miles covered and we were into Germany early afternoon (no border controls) and onto the unrestricted speed zones of the Autobahns.

When you're sitting at 80ish mph and being passed by a Porsche well in excess of 100 mph you have to be careful when moving out to overtake because the fast boys "creep up" on you rather swiftly. A couple of stops for coffee, snacks, fuel and trying out my German successfully we arrived in Hamburg at 5:00pm in rush hour traffic. Following a few minor detours, Mrs RT Rider's excellent directions and traffic filtering we found our bespoke hotel complete with scaffolding outside and the early 1900s lift out of action! Despite that we had a great room, a tasty evening meal and a comfortable night. Next morning we set off north heading for Denmark and onto Copenhagen. At the motorway border the Danish Police waved us through and then it was the chance to "tick off" one of my bucket list events: to ride over the Great Belt Bridge that links Copenhagen island to the Danish mainland. We negotiated the bridge and headed down to the Toll only for Mrs RT Rider to let go the 20 Kroner note, leaving it to flutter onto the Toll concourse. A hasty parking stop was made, I sprinted back and retrieved the note.

Another comfort break, coffee and a snack followed thereafter, two hours later, we arrived in outer Copenhagen on late Friday afternoon. A chat with a local gentleman, in perfect English, confirmed the directions to Valby where our friends live and once in the area their house was found quickly. What a great night - beer, schnapps, food, wine and laughter. The city break was spent visiting Copenhagen centre, museums, art galleries, the Little Mermaid, and the harbour area. More food, wine and schnapps were consumed and while it was great to meet up with our friends it was very difficult to leave. Nevertheless, we trust that they'll be over to Glenfarg this year to visit us.

On the Monday we rode back a similar route returning over the Great Belt Bridge, down into Germany to Bremen for our two night stopover. After crossing the border into Germany a stop was required for fuel, coffee and cakes

at a service station. Despite it being cold, sunny and dry a chat about the weather including an order for Curry Bratwurst mit Frites und Kaffees was most appreciated and consumed swiftly!

Mrs RT Rider was amazed at my German, she believes that I am bilingual – ha ha! Next stop Bremen and our hotel. Bremen has a lovely old centre and parks plus the Coffee Houses with their excellent cream cakes make for a great day out.


Up again on the Wednesday morning early, stuffed full of German breakfast, we departed for Ijmuden, Holland and the DFDS ferry home. We arrived at the port in plenty of time after negotiating the Amsterdam Ring Road (equivalent to London's M25) for the teatime sailing back to North Shields. It was a bit chilly riding



across Holland despite being "togged up" with warm gear and the heated seats "full on" we were pleased to be onboard the ferry as it was cosy. Arriving back in "Blighty" on the Friday morning it was a steady ride back up to Glenfarg. Once home thoughts were discussed about where to go in 2018? Having said that I still had my biker gang trips (over 50's guys) Whisky Tour to the Isle of Mull and Skye in June and the annual pilgrimage to Aviemore's Thunder in The Glens - the Harley Davidson themed rally in August. Now then, what's planned for 2018? The NC500, a Whisky trip and another trip to Europe are already in the planning.

Firstly, from the feedback on the night, the film was well received and for those who did attend—I was right in my preamble the weeks before, there were tears, however not all sad ones! The 'new' seating arrangements have gone down well with the audience and we hope to keep this arrangement to have a nicer warmer ambiance to enjoy the movie. Anyway I digress! A little about Lion itself:

Five-year-old Saroo gets lost on a train which takes him thousands of Kilometers across India, away from home and family. Saroo must learn to survive alone in Kolkata, before ultimately being adopted by an Australian couple. Twenty-five years later, armed with only a handful of memories, his unwavering determination, and a revolutionary technology known as Google Earth, he sets out to find his lost family. There's something unbearably potent about the image of a tiny, fragile child alone in a vast empty space. From the moment director Garth Davis places his camera high above a desolate railway station to capture five-year-old Saroo, vulnerable and separated from his older brother, we are emotionally snared by this story.

Davis, a first-time feature director with a background in commercials and television (*Top of the Lake*), delivers a confident debut. This adaptation of the true story of Saroo Brierley has some pacing issues and an overbearing score, but nothing that isn't erased by the swelling, tear-jerking crescendo of an ending.


So in a snow bound Glenfarg, we decided at try a last minute film for anyone with enough cabin fever to need out of their home but not venture all the way out of the village! Sufficient feedback came via the Facebook Grapevine to hire the hall and save some sanity! Well done Margaret for seizing the idea and delivering the event. The 'new seating 'idea came up this evening with the lower seats and tables at the front which really made if feel a much more relaxed and enjoyable experience.

The King's Speech plays out on the battlefield of words, not action. Writer David Seidler (doing keenly insightful work partly owing to his own bouts of stammering) had conceived the story first as a play. Before you think the words "static" and "confining," be advised that director Tom Hooper, garlanded with Emmy dust for John Adams, Elizabeth I, Longford and Prime Suspect, breathes fresh, urgent life into every frame of this powerhouse. Hooper, 37, is a prodigious talent. The emotion this film produces is staggering.

Hooper begins in 1925, as George VI (then merely Prince Albert) is trying to speak at the British Empire Exhibition. The words stick in his throat, and his silences between syllables fill the stadium. The prince's embarrassment is acute, and deeply felt by his compassionate wife Elizabeth (a superb Helena Bonham Carter), who goads him to visit speech therapist Lionel Logue. His Highness goes into heavy snob mode in the presence of this commoner. When Lionel first calls Albert "Bertie," Firth's poleaxed reaction is priceless. Lionel treats speech lessons like therapy sessions, pushing for details about life in the royal family. What he gets is a portrait of a blowhard father, George V (Michael Gambon), and a taunting brother, Edward VIII (Guy Pearce is absolutely stellar), who reduces the proud, vulnerable Albert to rubble by committing the one unforgivable sin: Edward abdicates the throne to marry American divorcee Wallis Simpson (Eve Best), leaving Bertie to succeed him. Suddenly, the man who would not be king most assuredly is.

The three pals, Stevie, Davie and Jonny had been out to the nearest city to have a few beers and some lunch. This they found to be a real pain in the neck since the local council had, in their infinite wisdom, decided to firstly close the only remaining hotel, bar and restaurant in the village, and then followed that by carving up the bus timetable and severely reduce the amount of buses, through the village (if they even turn up). But needs must because the local Hotel and bar had been closed for 18 months, so if

The other two voiced their agreement, and as they made their way around the building, they came to what was the former public bar. Stevie looked fondly through the window casting his mind back to the many fantastic days spent in there. Suddenly he let out a frantic cry, "Boys come here, look through the window, I can't believe what I am seeing!"

Sitting on a bar stool looking directly facing the window was what could only be described as an emaciated and wretched skeleton that was emphasised by two huge eye sockets staring menacingly at the three mates. It seemed to be laughing at them as there were two rows of teeth grinning as if in great mirth at something hilarious.

Jonny (always the sensible one) said "We need the police." as he hit 999 on his mobile phone. "What do we do?" said Davie as the three stood transfixed looking at the macabre vision grinning back at them.

Eventually, after what seemed like ages, two plain clothes police officers and a couple of uniforms arrived, "Hi, I'm DS Sadie Mcigue, and this is DC Les Hacket, so what's all this about a dead body, are you boys serious? "Just look through that window" said Stevie. After looking through the window, Sadie told Les to bring the crowbar from the car, "I'm not hanging about here" she said, "and I certainly can't wait for backup to arrive, plus I'm willing to bet we'll never find the key holder". Very soon, after a loud snapping noise, the door gave way and they were in.

Once inside, it was easy to see the body had been dead a very long time, so there was no option but to bring SOCO team in (Scene of Crime Officers). They were in luck! The team were soon to pass the village after just completing an investigation in Dundee. Heading up the team was a Professor Whiting known universally for his exacting and precise investigations into any suspicious death.




You're already reading it!

#### Robert Burns

'He'll hae misfortunes great an' sma'.

In the last article we left Burns in 1784, aged 25 years, unsure of what the future held.

He and his brother Gilbert had leased Mossgiel Farm and were determined to be successful farmers. Burns hoped his fortunes would change and said 'I entered on this farm with full resolution- I read farming books: I calculated crops; I attended



markets and in short, in spite of the 'The Devil, the world and the flesh' I believe I should have been a wise man'

However, as he had already observed in his poem 'To a Mouse', 'The best-laid schemes o' mice an' men Gang aft agley' and this was to be the case at Mossgiel. The land itself was high and 'mostly on a cold wet bottom'. The first year the seed they bought was bad and in the second year the spring was late and they lost half their crop each time.

This disheartened Burns but did not stifle his poetic or amorous passions. He becomes a father for the first time on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 1785 when Betty Paton, a farm servant, gives birth to his illegitimate daughter. Burns has also met Jean Armour, a woman who would figure throughout his life, and as observed by his brother Gilbert, their friendship reached a point where 'this connexion could no longer be concealed'.

It would seem that Burns saw a future with Jean as he wished to shield her 'from the consequences of their imprudence' and in1786 it was agreed between them that he would give her a written acknowledgement of marriage, a document sufficient by the law of Scotland to legalize their connexion. Burns begins to think about going to Jamaica to 'push his fortune' and that Jean should remain with her father until Burns was in a position to support her.

James Armour, a prosperous master mason and contractor in Mauchline, was said to be 'in the greatest dis'tress' when he heard his daughter's situation and he and his wife encouraged Jean to tear up the marriage proposal and forget about Burns. Under pressure from them and being a dutiful daughter Jean did what they wished and this was seen by Burns as a betrayal and huge slight on his character and it would take him a long time to forgive Jean, although forgive her he did!

Burns is weary, dispirited and angry and he arranges to become a book-keeper on an estate in Jamaica owned by a Dr. Douglas. He has, however, to find Nine Guineas to pay his passage and a friend Gavin Hamilton suggests that he publishes, by subscription, the poems he has written. In April 1786 he sends off his proposal for publishing 'Scottish Poems, by Robert Burns, One Vol. price (stitched) Three Shillings'.

Around this time, Burns has a mysterious dalliance with Mary Campbell, a nursery maid in the family of Mr Hamilton and this assures her fame forevermore as 'Highland Mary'. It is not known how they met but, as a friend of Gavin Hamilton, Burns would no doubt frequent his house on occasions. Despite or because of having been rejected by Jean Armour, Burns immediately throws himself into a head-over-heels relationship with Highland Mary. Burns says that they met 'by appointment, on the second Sunday of May, in a sequestered spot by the banks of Ayr, where we spent the day in taking a farewell, before she should embark for the West Highlands to arrange matters among her friends for our projected change of life'

They exchanged bibles and the inference taken from this account given by Burns is that Mary was to go with him to the West Indies where they would become man and wife! Mary dies in October 1786 and little is known of whether Burns saw much of her following their meeting in May.

In the meantime Jean Armour, who had been packed off to Paisley for 3 months by her parents, returns to Mauchline of Friday 9<sup>th</sup> June 1786.

On the 12<sup>th</sup>June Burns writes to a friend, David Brice, and in the letter says 'Poor, ill-advised, ungrateful Armour came home on Friday last. You have heard all the particulars of that affair, and a black affair it is. What she thinks of her conduct now, I don't know; one thing I do know - she has made me completely miserable. Never man lov'd, or rather ador'd, a woman more than I did her; and, to confess a truth between you and me, I do still love her to distraction after all, tho' I won't tell her so, tho' I see her, which I don't want to do.'



Reading this letter, penned only weeks after his romantic meeting with Highland Mary, you can only think that Burns, although bitter and hurt by Jeans actions, still loved her dearly. Yet here he was, trunk packed, waiting on his ship to take him to the Indies and having what appears to be more than just an affair with Mary Campbell!

On 25th June, Burns agrees to stand with Jean on three Sundays in

Mauchline Kirk to be harangued by the minister for their sins but after which he can obtain a certificate pronouncing him a free bachelor. But his troubles continue. On 30<sup>th</sup> July 1786 Burns writes an emotional letter to John Richmond, his closest friend in Mauchline. The letter dramatically begins,

'My Dear Richmond, My hour is now come - you and I will never meet in Britain more'.

He goes on to say that within three weeks he will be aboard the schooner 'Nancy' en-route to Jamaica but that Jeans father 'has got a warrant to throw me in jail till I find security for an enormous sum'. He tells Richmond that they tried to do this secretly but 'I got it from a channel they little dream of'. I wonder if this could have been Jean because he goes on in the letter to pour scorn on her parents but asks Richmond 'to spare the poor illadvised Girl for my sake'. Burns says he 'is wandering from one friend's house to another and like a true son of the Gospel, 'have nowhere to lay my head'.

The final paragraph of the letter reveals his despair and how sorry he was feeling for himself when he writes *'For Heaven's sake burn this letter, and never show it to a living creature - I write it in a moment of rage, reflecting on my miserable situation, - exil'd, abandon'd, forlorn'.* 

The year is 1786, Burns is now 27 years of age. He seems convinced that he is the victim of unfair treatment with little prospect of his situation and fortune improving and that the only solution is to leave the country he loves.

What will happen next? Will he be thrown in jail? Will he board the ship and sail off? Will his poetry subscription pay off?

their displays for the school. The best School House display will receive further rewards.



### Bake To Escape The Project

Some of you may know that I'm working on a book about how the process of baking can be a source of relief to people who suffer from anxiety, stress and/ or depression. There's also a bigger project in the 'baking' than just the book. Although I admit the book isn't finished yet, not even the first draft, but I'm definitely working on it.

I'm interested to experience firsthand the effect that baking has on people. As a former language teacher and IT trainer, I've been thinking about volunteering to use my teaching skills to provide tuition to people who might benefit from baking. Through a chance conversation with a fellow member of Perthshire Businesswomens' Network, in February I made contact



with PKAVS (Perth & Kinross Association of Voluntary Services). PKAVS are a charity and the description of what they do, that they publish on their www.pkavs.org is as follows:

"PKAVS is a small charity with a big heart working tirelessly to improve lives and connect communities throughout Perth & Kinross. We help over 5,000 local people through our 5 hubs - Carers, Minority Communities, Third Sector & Volunteering, and Mental Health & Wellbeing."

After discussion with PKAVS staff who provide services to help unpaid carers, I've now submitted an application to the 'Participatory Budgeting' fund administered by Perth and Kinross Council, to finance free baking lessons (the cost of ingredients and equipment) to carers in Kinross who are registered with PKAVS. If we're successful in getting funding, we'll run a pilot block of baking lessons and see how successful they are.

All being well, my next project would be to offer funded baking lessons to people in and around Glenfarg who are caring for someone and who'd like to try baking as a way of escaping, albeit temporarily, from the worries that their carer role may bring. 
### Glenfarg Bike Run

### 2. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING


Minutes of the previous meeting were agreed and signed. Proposed CCllr Taylor, seconded CCllr Horsman

#### 5. ARNGASK CEMETERY

CCllr Watson had sought the thoughts of the community on the preservation of the medieval statue, both through the newsletter and the Grapevine. Residents were asked to contact the CC secretary. CCllr Pilmer reported that he had only received two replies, one for preservation but unable to offer practical help, one against preservation on the grounds of cost. There had been only a very small number of comments on the Grapevine, some for and some against preservation.

CC with details of the recent PKC budget. He explained that there was a need to save £55 million over the next 5 years. It was felt that there had been an inequality in services between the Perth area and more rural areas. This was to be addressed and £1.2 million has been made available as a local investment fund for local projects.
