As we look forward to Autumn and the darkening and shorter days of winter, perhaps like me, you are hoping for some decent programmes on the telly? One of my favourites last year, was a BBC docusoap called "Fake or Fortune". Journalist Fiona Bruce teamed up with art expert Philip Mould to investigate mysteries behind paintings. By using scientific techniques and detailed analysis, they decided which paintings were the genuine article and which ones were fake. One episode focussed on a still life painting by the British painter William Nicholson – at least, that is what was assumed. The likeable lady who purchased it in 2008 paid the whopping sum of £165,000. It depicted a glass jug, a pile of plates and two pears. Maybe not the kind of thing you might like hanging on your wall, but the owner in question, Lyn, was obviously very fond of it indeed. Questions had been asked about its authenticity and that is when the programme makers stepped in. As a result of extensive research, consultation with art experts, and an interview with an art forger, the news was not good. At the end of the programme lovely Lyn, is told the bad news: her painting is deemed a fake and therefore worth very little. Although disappointed and deeply affected by the blow, Lyn is brave and all she says, in the end, are the enigmatic words: "This too shall pass". And the credits roll.

Her apt quotation is often thought to be Biblical, but it is probably an Iranian saying used by the Sufi poets. As the writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes, a philosopher called Qohelet, was also wise enough to point out: if we are having a happy and good time in life, then it is best to enjoy it whilst we can because it won't last for ever. And, on the other side of the coin, if we are currently experiencing a sad or difficult passage in our lives, then that too, will (thankfully) come to a conclusion. Saint Paul, in his Second letter to the Corinthians wrote something similar, but with a more hopeful slant:

"...this small and temporary trouble we suffer will bring us a tremendous and eternal glory.... What can be seen lasts only a time, but what cannot be seen, lasts for ever."

The viewers of the programme are left with the distinct impression, that even although she has just lost a great deal of money, Lyn has no intention of tearing her favourite painting off her living room wall. Worthless it might be, in an extrinsic sense, but she remains captivated by its beauty and artistic qualities, regardless of who may have actually painted it. Although saddened, it remains her picture and she is holding onto it right reason or none.

"Good for her!", I say. Faith is sometimes about acknowledging that life can be very good or very bad. The trick is to accept that neither condition will last. We hold on to an unchanging God, who remains steadfast and who cares for us whilst undergoing all of life's widely varying conditions. We too hold on to our picture, faults, deep disappointments and all, because it is our picture and although not perfect, we trust that God will indeed transform it one day into "a tremendous and eternal glory".

Meanwhile, why not get up into that attic and see what you uncover? "Fake or Fortune" wants to hear from you.

The Glenfarg Community Centre

The project to establish a Community Centre at the Schoolhouse adjoining the village hall is progressing well. An Open Day was held on May 19th. It was a very successful day which raised awareness of the Community Centre project and produced a lot of ideas from those who attended. We had over seventy visitors, many of whom have now joined the charity as members. (There are now over 150 members so if you have not done so visit the Glenfarg Community Centre website and fill in the membership application form).



The main feedback received at the Open Day was that the house was a

lot bigger than expected and was very solid and well built, the garden was very pleasant and a great asset, and there was a lot of potential in both the house and garden to create a facility of value to the village. Several visitors indicated a willingness to help in various ways and there were lots of ideas about what activities there could be in the Community Centre.

In early June, the rear part of the garden was cleared so that it could be used for the Glenfarg Gala. Thanks to all the volunteers and to Billy Allison for help with this. On June 26th over twenty volunteers helped to clear out the old floor coverings from the house and put them in a skip kindly provided by Binn Skips.

An architect has been appointed to prepare plans for the conversion of the house and to apply for planning permission and building warrant for this work. Work will start shortly to repair the roof and carry out internal timber preservation and damp treatment. Plumbing work is also planned to replace old lead pipes and install a new hot water heating system.

Once this essential repair and maintenance work has been completed and the relevant consents achieved, work will start to convert the house into a community facility linked to the hall itself with a café/bistro and a variety of club rooms.

Fund raising is going well and the Committee gratefully acknowledges the support of the Scottish Land Fund, the Gannochy Trust, Foundation Scotland, the Thomson Trust, the Kinross Community Investment Fund, Earnside Coaches, and the many individuals who have made donations,

helped out and pledged support so far. Further fund raising is needed to bridge the funding gap and local fund raising is also going well. The volunteers and supporters of the Hall Coffee Lounge have been raising funds to support the project, and members οf Committee and other local supporters have signed up for the Kilt Walk in Edinburgh taking place on September



15th. Visit the Kilt Walk website to find out more. You can make a contribution or even take part yourself – and for every £1 raised The Hunter Foundation will add a further 40p. This is a great way to make fund raising go further. The Kilt Walkers would like to thank all those who have made generous contributions so far. Hopefully we will be able to bridge the funding gap to allow all the conversion work to be completed quickly so that the Schoolhouse can begin to be of real value and benefit to our community. Remember that the Gannochy Trust has kindly offered to match our local fund raising pound for pound up to a further £5,000. The old telephone box has received a rub down and is about to re-painted and fitted out with shelving to turn it into a book exchange.



NOVEMBER 8th

'Dirty Pretty Things' is a thriller from 2002. Okwe, a kind-hearted Nigerian doctor, and Senay, a Turkish chambermaid, work at the same West London hotel. The hotel is run by Senor "Sneaky" and is the sort of place where "dirty business" like drug dealing and prostitution takes place. However, when Okwe makes a shocking discovery, he uncovers something far more sinister than just a common crime. This film was nominated for an Oscar for its screenplay.

DECEMBER 6th

You may have noticed new additions to the display planters on the South verge where two rather large planters and basket trees have been positioned. Over time these will become an attractive addition to the many




other planters that blossom every year. We are grateful to the 'Community Environment Challenge Fund' for their financial support with this venture.

A Long Long Time Ago.....

So begins American Pie, Don McLean's homage to the early rock and rollers, Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens and the Big Bopper who perished in that fateful flight on February 3rd 1959. McLean was a 13-year-old paperboy in New Rochelle, New York and a big Buddy Holly fan when Holly died. He learned about the plane crash when he cut into his stack of papers and saw the lead story.



There have been countless articles written about this anthemic song and McLean has never really gone into any detail about the meaning of the somewhat strange verses. He was always being asked to interpret the song and must have gotten pretty fed up with this question. While being interviewed in

1991, McLean was asked for probably the 1000th time, "What does the song 'American Pie' mean to you?" to which he answered, "It means never having to work again for the rest of my life."

When you sit down and look at it closely it does develop into a pretty strange song but I have never tried to delve into the meaning of the song and have just enjoyed its melody and its catchy chorus.

When the song was written in 1971, I was 25yrs old and had bought a guitar two years previously. When I bought the guitar I naively thought I would learn it in a few weeks, never realizing that 50 years later I would still be learning! The first months were painful, literally, with the steel strings cutting into the top of my left hand fingers as I pressed the strings

as hard as I could to stop them buzzing. American Pie has a great chord structure and I set to, trying to master it over many months, eventually succeeding in managing what I though was a passable version of the song.

Having a guitar and being able to play a few songs I found that when I was invited to parties it was always stipulated that I brought my guitar along so we could have a bit of a sing song. I was perfectly willing to do this and took my guitar and enthusiastically played some popular songs. However it soon became obvious to me that selecting the time to play was critical. Too early and everyone was too shy to get up and sing, too late and everyone was too drunk to remember all the words! I say 'all the words' with tongue in cheek as I found that most people only knew the chorus and a few lines of verse of most of the songs they suggested.

American Pie was the song that finally made me stop taking my guitar to parties. During the evening someone was bound to ask 'Can you play American Pie' and I would duly start off 'A long, long time ago, I can still remember how that music used to make me smile...' and I found that nearly everybody was with me through the first verse and chorus and maybe the first few lines of the second verse but after that I was on my own until the chorus when everybody would join in again. If you know the song then you will know that after the second verse it all gets a bit surreal and most people lose interest until the chorus comes round again. If you sing the whole 889 words of the song then you inevitably end up singing on your own as most people have lost interest and left to plunder the crisp bowl or get another drink.



Trike Tours



Wallace Park - Past Present & Future

Past: Thanks to a local resident, Friends of Wallace Park have recently acquired some paperwork associated with the long slide in the park. It seems that some time ago, the mums of local primary school kids felt that something extra was needed in the park and so they fundraised for the slide. That got us thinking. Who was the park named after? The information board simply says 'A former owner of Duncrievie gave the park to Glenfarg'. Later, Mr J L Anderson built a pyramid-shaped cairn on the wooded mound known as Druid's Grave. Apparently, it contains a canister of items linked to the park.

Present: At present, FOWP are working on the sun clock. Soon new gravel will be in place and the numbers/months on the stones will be painted to make them easier to read. So, when did the sun clock appear? And who was responsible for its creation? These were the questions we were asking ourselves as we cleared away the stones and weeds.



The wooden animals have also been giving us some cause for concern. Despite the Community Council arranging to have them repainted this year, we have been warned that they are not in good condition and won't go on for ever. Standing out in all weathers is taking its toll. But does anyone remember the animals sauntering into the park to take up residence? Where did they come from?

Having nearly finalised the plans for the park's development, the Friends of Wallace Park are also busy with the frustrating job of filling in funding application forms and looking for sponsorship.

Future: Not sure what developments are planned? Have a look on our temporary notice board at the Elm Row entrance to the park. Working with TRACKS, who created the path to Duncrievie and The Avenue to the school, we are confident that we can raise the finance and get the paths extended around the park before next summer. And PKC should have the kids' play area upgraded by then as well.

Lots of new building in Glenfarg. Remember, anyone new to the village, gets their tennis free for the first year. Form an orderly but impatient queue.



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
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Request for Information

I have very recently moved to Glenfarg, and wondered if any of your readers have any records or photos relating to Easterton Farm, Glenfarg from the early 1940's?

My late father (Robert Craig) was born while his parents were living

at Easterton Farm, where my Grandfather was employed as a Cattleman. My grandparents were William (Willie) Craig and Helen Craig (nee Gray). I don't know many details, as my grandparents moved around a lot. However, I do know that my father was born on 14th May 1941, in the midst of an unseasonable blizzard - and that the snow was so deep that the ambulance struggled to get



up the hill from Glenfarg. It must have managed somehow, as my dad was born in hospital in Perth, and then brought home to Easterton. My grandparents moved away from Glenfarg within a few years, and my father then spent his early school years in Errol. I would love to hear from anybody who has any records relating to this time - or copies of any photos which I could look at, to see if I could identify my grandparents!

The Lady Vanishes

Four hundred and ninety two years ago a lady of Scottish nobility gifted land and money to her local church. In return, prayers were to be said, in perpetuity, for the souls of herself, her family and the king. It would have been in recognition of this generous donation that a statue in her likeness was erected within the church precinct.

Unbeknownst to the lady, the protestant reformation was just around the corner when a great deal of church statuary was destroyed. Eventually the old church was demolished and another erected in its place. But some consideration for the statue remained as it was taken to a safe place and then reinstated after the new church was completed.

Through the long centuries, the statue endured, surviving the union of the crowns, the covenanting wars, the '15 and '45 rebellions, the agricultural revolution and the various schisms of the church.

Fast forward to the present day and, of course, we are talking about the statue of Margaret Barclay, standing in its patch of weeds behind temporary fencing in Arngask kirkyard. It has to be admitted that the centuries have not been kind to Margaret and weathering has removed a great deal of the original detail. A report in 2016 was commissioned to assess the condition of the statue and recommend what conservation work would be needed. But to date, no action has been taken.

However, all is not lost. Advances in computing have meant that Structure-from-Motion (SfM) photogrammetry, once the exclusive domain of specialists companies, is now available to all. Thanks to the generosity of the internet community, the software and tutorials needed are all freely available. With SfM photogrammetry, three dimensional images are created from two dimensional photographs. Even today in our world of clever computers, the results are quite impressive. The 3D image

can be rotated both horizontally and vertically and zoomed in and out. Being in three dimensions, the detail is much greater than that of a conventional photograph.

The SfM photogrammetric survey of the Margaret Barclay revealed some statue interesting features. For many years it was reported that the statue, "... has beads used by the Catholics hanging around hands " the Closer examination shows that the beads are in fact the frills of the dress cuffs. Rotating the head clearly shows that the nose and chin have been broken off, rather than eroded away. By



tilting the image, it is even possible to make out the outline of a brooch on the bodice of the dress.

No matter how much the statue deteriorates in the coming years there is now a detailed digital record of how it appears today. Using the computer image, it would not be beyond the realms of possibility to create a physical model of the statue.

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

1. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING:

Minutes of the previous meeting were agreed and signed. Proposed CCIIr Horsman, seconded CCIIr Faser

2. ACTION POINT UPDATES:

<u>Crash Barriers:</u> CCllr Pilmer reported that Cllr Purves had confirmed in writing that he had put forward the CCs request for an update to Charles Haggart.of PKC.



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However, due to Cllr Purves and Mr Haggart being on annual leave, the matter is still pending an outcome from PKC. (CCllr Pilmer)

Elm Row Pumping Station: CCIIr Pilmer reported that he had received a positive result following his letter to Scottish Water. The existing old wooden fence and the substitute metal barriers are to be replaced with a new wooden post with rails fence. This work should be completed during August/September.

Ladeside Road works: CCllr Fraser reported that his correspondence to PKC had been met with a non-committal answer concerning access for the village shop and a general public notification/advertisement. However, steps were taken by the CC to publish information via the Grapevine and the CC Notice Board. Also, the owners of the Village Shop had received verification that, when possible, access to the road immediately outside the Village Shop would be maintained pending work activities. CCllr Pilmer reported that he had received notification from PKC that the works were proceeding better than expected and that works on this road's junctions would be completed too with the outcome being ahead of schedule.

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
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COMPETITIVE RATES Countryside Youth Community: CCIIr Watson reported that the object of the Charity (CYC) is simply to introduce City Kids to the Countryside and in the next 9 months they are developing partnerships throughout Scotland. There are plans for the Easterton Lodge as a leased base for the Charity, it will be developing over time and with an intended launch date in the late Spring of 2020. Providing an event is launched through a school activity, then an offer was made for a spokesperson to attend with the view to address the young persons about the topic.

CCIIr Pilmer reported that Police Scotland's Community Policing team village officer, PC Douglas Stapleton, had met with CCIIr Pilmer to discuss a number of matters. PC Stapleton confirmed Police Scotland's approach to the community was one of responding to incidents



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including visits as per operational requirements. 7. AOCB:

Scottish Water Community Event: CCIIr Faser reported that he and CCIIr Pilmer had attended this event on Wednesday 19th June. The event was an open forum that allowed CCIIrs to raise any matter to do with water (for example quality, investment, future plans) in relation to Scottish Water as a public supplier. CCIIr Fraser raised the point about an odour in the water supply to Glenfarg village and that it raised concern with some residents. Scottish Water were aware of this point and their Director of Technical & Scientific Services explained what was being done to the water supply, why and what the outcome has been. There are strict measures in place to monitor the water quality and that the Chlorine level has been adjusted to reduce the odour without compromising the quality. CCllrs Fraser and Pilmer were offered a tour of the Water Treatment works and this will take place in due course.

Kinross-shire Forum: CCllr Fraser explained that he and CCllr Taylor had attended the most recent Forum held at the Kinross Community Campus. The main focus about the meeting was the delegation of matters that could be taken on by the Forums such as funds relating to local initiatives. For example: Speed measuring of vehicles through communities by local residents, Road repairs and Transport. The idea is that whilst PKC have





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an overall authority, local Forums headed up by local Cllrs with full voting rights and CCllrs with an advisory capacity may be best placed to tackle local needs allowing them to be addressed quickly and be more meaningful to their communities. A fact-finding paper with notification of intentions has been issued to all of Kinross-shire's Cllrs and CCllrs to gather feedback and with comments to be returned week ending 12th July.

Roads and Pavements: At the last CC meeting, a member of the public requested that this topic required addressing in as much that there appeared to be no monthly/bi-monthly schedule. The member of the public raised the matter again that to date no works have taken place to any of the CCllrs' knowledge nor that of the member of the public. The CC was tasked with contacting the local PKC Cllr Robertson to progress this matter once again. Also, to clarify what PKC schedule is in place to address the requirements of Glenfarg village. GCC Secretary to contact CCllr Robertson. (CCllr Pilmer & Cllr Robertson)

Social Housing: A member of the public raised the matter of tenancy and a commitment to the care of properties as allocated by PKC. Cllr Watters explained the ethos behind the allocation of housing and commitment for property care. There was a request to explore the matter further by the member of public and that Cllr Robertson had been helpful in providing

information previously. The GCC states that it is not up to nor a desire of theirs to make comments about Social Housing tenancy however, an exploration of the topic as whole will be carried out. (CCIIr Pilmer & CIIr Robertson)

Wallace Park: CCllrs Watson and Fraser spoke about the future plans for the park and that Drawings with plans would be available for review and discussion after the Business Meeting. CCllr Horsman spoke about sourcing funding to assist with the financial aspirations. Cllr Watters was able to give notice about a fund that may assist and that funding from the Lochelbank Wind Farm community fund could be another source. The CC voiced its support to the present plan and agreed to put its name to the Planning Application. Update at next CC meeting. (CCllrs)

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
