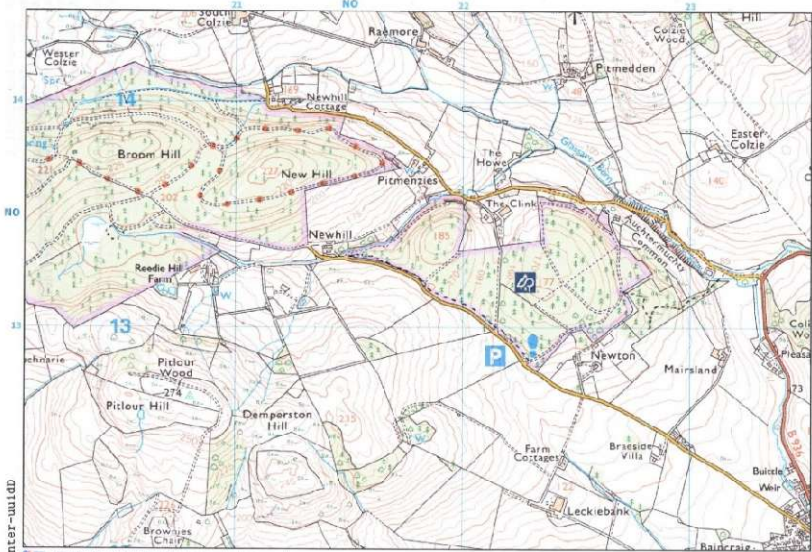


Scout Update

Many thanks to all who attended the Burns Supper at the end of January, we raised over £500. A great time was had by all. Alex and Kirsten, the new owners of Arngask Church, gave brilliant toasts to the lassies and laddies. They both thanked the village for the warm welcome they have received and now feel they belong to the village.

The annual scout night hike was held in February. The venue was Pittmeden Forrest. Like previous night hikes it was dry but not cold. On a previous occasion we had huge snow flakes falling gently and the scouts had made snow angels when back at the carpark.

Some of the scouts had been on the night hike before and claimed they didn't need a map as they knew where they were. Eventually everyone



was engaged in the navigation process, finding where they were on the map and they direction to head to the next check point.

A pigeon erupted from a tree above us, the noise magnified in the dark. We had to leave the main route in places to avoid the damage from storm Eowyn. We were able to identify the newly blown over trees as the

3) Resources for General Duties

Planting and ground maintenance: We have almost 60 containers in total (including planters, troughs and baskets) in the village. We also have three beds (two in Ash Grove and one at the end of Wallace Park, on the Duncricvie Road). Our wild meadow areas are maintained solely by Eric Hayward who does an amazing job.

Duncricvie has their own set of planters and barrels which are managed by the householders there. Ann Caudrey co-ordinates all this, so if you feel you would like to help, please get in touch with her directly (details above)

Spring and summer: We are starting to get excited (and slightly panicked) about getting our planting plan in action. But, before we can look forward to seeing our summer displays, there is quite a bit of work to be done, i.e.

preparing the beds and planters, choosing suitable plants and of course completing the planting plan. Summer is also a very busy season for us, keeping the grass cut, borders trimmed, watering, weeding and keeping on top of things.

Autumn: In autumn we clear out all the containers, plant the bulbs for the following year and do a general tidy up before the winter.

Village Green clean up: We also have a community day (usually late Sept/early Oct) where many of you kindly join us in the Green to help do some cleaning-up operations including cutting back, tidying up and removing any debris etc. Last year, several hardy volunteers from the village teamed up with us in October to give the Village Green its annual tidy up before the winter. The day started with a heavy downpour of rain, and we did consider cancelling, but the weather forecast came good and the sun shone. Everybody spread out to tackle the various jobs – cutting



down the Gunnera and other large plants around the pond; weeding and cutting back around the channel which surrounds the pond as well as general cutting back of shrubs and unwanted saplings.

We always make sure to allow time for socialising and enjoying some refreshments. Everything stopped for coffee/tea, scones and home-baking at 11am and then back to work for another hour. It was a magnificent effort by the committee and volunteers alike, and we managed to fill a skip. We left the Green looking trim and tidy for all of us to enjoy.

Machinery and equipment: We have a lot of machinery and equipment, which is kept in our building in Hayfield Road, to enable all volunteers to carry out tasks. 'Monty', our Kawasaki vehicle, is well known around the village. It is the watering source for our planters and baskets and a general workhorse at other times. We also have a ride on mower to keep the south verge and Village Green neat and tidy. Three strimmers, a pedestrian mower and a full array of hand tools complete our inventory. All this equipment needs to be looked after and maintained as well as using of course.

We are always looking for new recruits to help us continue our work and provide new ideas for the future. The village will only continue to look attractive if there are enough people to share the workload. You don't need to be an expert in horticulture, you just need a pair of willing hands and a pair of wellies. If you feel you would like to join us planting, pruning, watering, cutting grass, maintaining our machinery or any other GDIB activity, just put your hand up if that is you! You will be made very welcome.

We round off the season with *To Walk Invisible* to pay homage to arguably the greatest family of writers, the Bronte sisters.



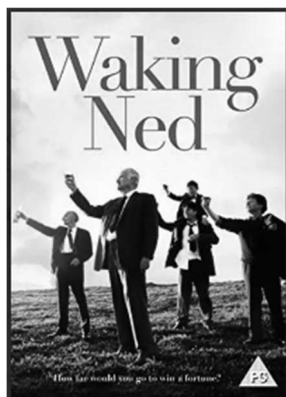

Community Centre



The community centre successfully applied for grants from CARES (£34,980), RWE Lochielbank (£3,500) and Greener Living (£2,930) plus £2315 from our own reserves to install a 21Kwatt solar array spread over two roofs and a 40.5Kwatt hour battery storage system. The battery storage system has the capacity to store enough energy to power the hall for three hours at night. The solar array is big enough to support an EV charge point in the car park. For the first month of use, October 2024, the solar system and batteries supplied the hall with 62% of the power it used. By the end of 2024 we had planted the equivalent of 17.7 trees and saved 290kg of carbon dioxide generation from use of the panels and system. We have replaced the flood lights with LED flood lights and reduced the electricity required to light the hall by 83%.

For those of you who have not been in the main hall recently we have changed the heaters to far infra-red no glow. They now keep you warm (provided the door is shut) and don't produce a red glow that burns the top of your head. We have plans to continue to improve the hall while developing the community centre. Come along to one of the many events and see for yourself.

Hospitality Development Update

The development of the former Schoolhouse into a Community Hospitality Space took a major step forward recently when the Trustees received formal Planning Permission from PKC. The images below and on the cover of the newsletter are computer generated from the approved



plans. We have now instructed our Architect to formalise the detailed project drawings and apply for the Building Warrant. The project will deliver a permanent hospitality facility for the community and

hopefully will become a welcoming social space for all residents. Coffee in the morning, socialise in the afternoon and light refreshment in the evening. With the technical aspects of the project well in hand, we have also been busy fund raising to pay for the development. A huge effort was made within the last couple of months to try to secure funding from SSEN Community Fund, but unfortunately we were unsuccessful.

The Community Centre Trustees have formed a new funding sub-committee and every effort will be made to source alternative means of finance for the project. The sub-

committee is keen to hear from anyone in the community who has the skills required and who would be willing to offer their support and expertise to help us

He has years of experience working for farms and market gardens. His wealth of experience will not only add to the success of our first proper market garden but it is also a joy to have someone so local work with us. We are delighted that he will be able to call Arngask his workplace and

hopefully his second home. We are so passionate that we grow things

well here on the farm, starting with veg but closely followed by community.

2025 for us as a family will be one where we hit 'go' to try and grow the farm even more. Lloyd has now left his part time job and is a full time 'farmer'! So whilst that brings the joy of having him home and achieving more - we also have a lot of work to do to make sure the farm supports us this year. We are excited for the challenge ahead and passionate about seeing the farm grow, flourish and give back.

To all who live in Glenfarg, we are deeply grateful for your support and your following our journey into 2025. It is going to be an exciting year and we hope to invite you to the farm soon to have a look at what we as a new team are producing and achieving.

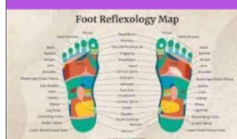

Energy Update

With the long spells of cold weather over the past months, are you thinking of making improvements to your home's heating and insulation? Greener Glenfarg has always wanted to be able to offer advice on insulation and heating. One of the things we can do is learn from each other's experiences. Here is one story from a Glenfarg resident:

"We recently undertook a transformation of our home from cold, inefficient and not very eco-friendly to a warmer, greener system with help from a grant from the Scottish government.

As with many properties in the village, ours is 100 plus years old. It had a very poor energy rating and was described as 'difficult to insulate' by one company we asked previously. However, the tide has turned and now rural, hard to insulate/heat homes are now eligible for help to move to greener systems.

We had internal insulation added to external walls, top-up loft insulation, an air source heat pump (which requires all new pipework and radiators), and solar panels.

I had my reservations, thinking the air source heat pump would never be as warm as the oil-fired boiler, however I am pleased to say that the house is much more cosy, and an even temperature throughout.

I can't comment on comparison of cost to run as we've only had it installed just over a month, however having the solar panels will reduce the cost of electricity to run the system during daylight hours.

Whilst there is no denying the work is a big upheaval, and if you currently have a beautifully decorated home then it would be even more intrusive than for ourselves who were needing to decorate everywhere anyhow, I would definitely say it was worth the hassle."

If the cost is putting you off, for those on a low income or with certain health conditions the work can be fully funded. Certainly worth investigating.

Grants and interest-free loans are handled by Home Energy Scotland. Lots of information on their website, plus a Warmer Homes Scotland eligibility tool.

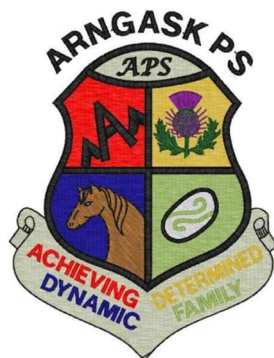

Arngask Primary School & Nursery



Since the last article for the newsletter, the school has been a hive of activity with lots of learning, both inside and out, competitions, visitors to the school and our children taking the lead in presenting our efforts and experiences in a variety of topics. These topics

run through all of our learning, however can be quite subtle.

We have had an online visit from UNICEF UK, looking at the work and learning that had undertaken in Rights Respecting Schools. Throughout the school, we encourage the children to learn about their rights and what all children should have as a child. In January, we found out that we had achieved our SILVER Accreditation, which was a super achievement! Arngask have joined only 15 other schools in Perth and Kinross with this. Over the last two years, the Digital Leaders Pupil Voice group have worked to become a Digital School. Again, an online meeting was organised and the Leaders, some that have been in the group for three years and been ambassadors for Digital learning, explained how digital learning was used throughout the school. Katharine Jewitt, our validator, said 'The way you and the rest of the school, including pupils have led the digital journey was very inspirational and it was clear that digital education is fully embedded across the whole school.' We have been recommended to become a Mentor school for Digital and in March 2024, we were awarded our Digital Schools Award.

Under the guidance of Mrs Johnston, our Eco committee aimed to gain their 6th Green flag. Between organising litter rotas, creating an Eco rap displayed in each class, Eco Leaders ran workshops throughout the school and they had a big Eco tidy day. By now our children were very good at online interviews and put their points over very clearly. 'The commitment shown by your Eco-Committee has been outstanding, and it was wonderful to see how everyone across the school became involved in this journey thanks to them. I was very inspired by the

initiative and resolution shown throughout the journey and by how much fun you all seemed to have had in general throughout your work.’ High praise indeed from the Education and Learning Team. 6th Green Flag awarded! These are 3 national achievements that we have achieved recently, however every day we are always trying our best to ‘Be the Best We Can Be’.

Arngask Church

The building we see today, standing in Church Brae, was a replacement for the smaller building which opened in 1843. It's a simple building of the early Victorian period with one interesting glass memorial window and a beautiful barrel-vaulted ceiling. To many of the older residents of Glenfarg it has been there all their life, but change within the Church of Scotland, has meant that it has had to close as a place of worship, and it will have a new future.



Families will have had their children christened there, couples will have spoken their vows as they got married, and sadly we will have said goodbye to many residents of this wonderful community. Fond memories of coffee mornings, remembrance services, Christmas Eve carol singing and many more events for us all to remember.

The church contents have been carefully cleared out and many have been retained in the village with the intention that they will be put on display in an archive room within the Old Schoolhouse.

The church was put up for sale last year and I am pleased to say it has been purchased and the new owners intend to convert it into a family home. Within the village we have seen other buildings fall out of use and their facilities lost, so it is great to know that we can look forward to the church building having a new and exciting future - David Aird

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Our Community Energy Ltd

Did you know that the Glenfarg community is part owner of the wind turbines at Binn Ecopark? The wind farm was developed and is operated by a company called Greencat Renewables

(<https://www.greencatrenewables.co.uk/>) who came to an agreement with the landowner Binn Group. Under the rules of the government Feed In Tariff (FiT) scheme, permission was given for four turbines on condition that two of them were given into local community ownership. Ownership and any profits from the two community turbines



are shared equally amongst four neighbouring community council areas:

- Abernethy
- Auchtermuchty & Strathmiglo
- Bridge of Earn
- Glenfarg

So how much money is expected to become available to the four communities? The construction project was financed using bank loans, so most initial profits will go to loan repayments until the loan is paid off. However, £50K was made available to the communities in 2023 and another £50K has been approved for release in May 2025. There is reasonable confidence of an ongoing £25K per year thereafter until 2028. Beyond 2028 there is greater uncertainty due to loan refinance and energy prices but expectation is an ongoing £25K per year until 2038. After 2038, the bank loan repayment will hopefully conclude, allowing for a substantial increase in payments, forecast in the order of £300K+ per year for the last six years of operation.

How is the money distributed to the four communities? 75% goes to the three communities of Abernethy, Auchtermuchty & Strathmiglo and Glenfarg. The money is paid into the Foundation Scotland Binn Wind Turbine Community Fund

(<https://www.foundationscotland.org.uk/apply-for-funding/funding-available/binn-wind-turbine-community-fund>). Applications can be made to that fund and are considered by a separate Foundation Scotland panel with community representatives.



Bridge of Earn have chosen a different route for receiving their 25% of any funds from the wind farm. They are currently establishing their own Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) to be called Lower Earn Trust.

The company overseeing the running of the two community wind turbines is called “Our Community Energy Ltd” and it is registered with the Financial Conduct Authority:

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Glenfarg Community Council Minutes

Glenfarg Community Council Business Meeting 7:30pm, Monday 3rd March 2025, Glenfarg Community Centre (Village Hall).

Attendees: Cllrs Ponton, Pilmer, Chistie, Murray, Macleod. PKC Cllr Robertson, PKC Cllr Freshwater and 9 members of the public.

Welcome by the GCC Chair Cllr Ponton.

1. Apologies: Cllrs Fraser and Smart, Police Scotland PC Samson. PKC Cllr Cuthbert.

2. Approval of last Business Meeting Minutes held on Monday 6th January 2025: Cllrs Ponton and Macleod 09/01/2025.

3. Police Report

In PC Samson's absence Cllr Pilmer, Secretary, advised on the following since the 6th of January 2025:

37 calls and 16 crimes recorded on the Police Systems. 7 of these were from the incident listed in Crimes of Note. Due to an isolated incident and Police pre-planned operation. 8 were from a repeat isolated incident involving an individual who has now moved from the Local Authority area and there is no wider risk. This also saw an increase in calls over the period. Another crime was nothing of note.

30/1/2025. Report of Offence – Resist arrest x 2 Police Assault x 3, Threatening or Abusive behaviour x 2. Result 2 x charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal. All associated with Greenbank Crescent, Glenfarg.

Also, Police Scotland will make every effort to carry out speed checks across the area during their patrols. Main Street was checked and no speeding tickets issued during that event. We, Police Scotland, often post on our Twitter page @PSOSPerthKin with updates on what we are doing out and about in the local area under #KinrossCPT. Please feel free to follow us!

Kinross CPT would encourage members of the public to sign up to rural watch Scotland (www.ruralwatchscotland.co.uk) and neighbourhood watch Scotland (www.neighbourhoodwatchscotland.co.uk) for updates and alerts on local issues, crime prevention advice etc.

When operationally possible the local Community Policing team shall make a visit to the Village Hall Coffee morning on a Thursday.

4. Correspondence and Action Points

Correspondence: Cllr Pilmer, Secretary, reported the following:

A letter from BLC Energy in relation to a proposed Solar Farm at Binn. The matter has been acknowledged and Cllr Ponton is to liaise with the contact. Proposal is a 36MWp Solar Farm comprising around 60,000 panels across 120 acres generating up to 33,700MWhrs of renewable energy. A planning application is proposed towards December 2025. *Action Cllr Ponton*

A letter was received from SEPA regarding Proposed Changes to the Environmental Regulation (Scotland) Guidance on Public Participation and Fit and Proper Person Test. This is a consultation, and any comments are to be fed back to SEPA. Publish on media for the public. *Action CClr Pilmer*

An email letter from PKC regarding a Cycling in Kinross-shire Survey was passed on to one of the Glenfarg Cycling group for action.

Scottish Woodlands Meeting Glenfarg Community Centre 2nd December 2024. CClr Pilmer reported that he had written to Fraser Wight 24th January asking for an update about the project's amendments. Only an acknowledgement and that matters were still being put together was received accordingly. The GCC awaits an update.

Action Points

Greenbank Road PKC Cllr Robertson. CClr Ponton explained that her correspondence about Greenbank Road to PKC Social Housing matter remains unanswered. PKC Cllr Robertson to raise this matter.

Cllr Robertson spoke about the matter/situation and that he had received a reply from Social Housing that matters were progressing with two properties. A general discussion took place with all in attendance. It was understood that matters concerning the physical condition of the outside of the properties in question had seen some improvement but no complete reinstatement back to their original condition as gardens with partition fencing. Vehicles, their parts and other factors are of great concern as is their location in the gardens' grounds. It was discussed further that Police Scotland visitations (patrols) in general to Glenfarg have waned and that a letter be written to them asking for regular visitations (patrols) to take place. *Action CClr Pilmer*

8. Sustainability Group (SG) Meeting

CCLlr Ponton raised the matter of the Joint Group of nine Community Councils in the SG that has as its main topic the proposed Winfarm at Carnbo. Presently the SG is putting in place a Constitution so that it can best manage any income from Wind Farm Benefits in the Kinross-shire area. Glenfarg along with Abernethy, Bridge of Earn, Gateside and Strathmiglo is in a unique position that it is involved already in Community Benefit from a Wind farm and the discussion raised a concern about any future rights from the renewal of benefits from a current Windfarm or its successor at the end of its Electricity producing period. Very much work in progress. *Action GCC*

9. Local Place Plan (LPP)

CCLlr Ponton raised the matter that PKC has requested that communities raise their own LPP for their Ward in relation to a vision for the future. It's not about housing developments, in their own right, but what works, what doesn't work, what could work and how do we get there as a community. Perhaps housing, perhaps energy generation, perhaps well being facilities, perhaps community benefits from energy resources, perhaps connectivity (IT). Lots of thoughts need to go into this, so ideas please from the GCC. *Action CCLlrs.*

10. Wallace Park Path

Following a request from a member of the public a proposal was put forward that there needs to be a proper path constructed with hard core material/tarmacadam/slabs from the Wallace Car park to the existing pathway. The grass is very slippery when wet/ice over/snowed over and a new path would allow for a more direct route and allow itself to be treated in wintry conditions with salt/salted gravel. Greenspace to become

involved for a solution. *Action CCllr Ponton*. N.B. It was noted by the GCC that a few new sapling trees are to be relocated too.

11. Speeding

A discussion took place about the speed of vehicles through the village on the B996 and what could be done by PKC further to reduce speed (in particular) at the entry and exits North and South (MPHs are 60-40-30 currently). Speed ramps, reduction to 20 MPH, Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) were all discussed. It was emphasised by Cllr Robertson that there is a major backlog of works to be carried out that will see 20 MPH introduced in villages and other areas overall as part of a PKC Roads strategy, however this will take a number of years to implement. It was discussed further by the GCC to raise the matter again with PKC. *Action CCllr Pilmer*

12. Binn Turbines

A Mr A.Swanson, has been appointed as a Director (for a three year period) to the Our Community Energy Ltd (OCE Ltd). The OCE Ltd has access to the community benefit from two of the four turbines that are located on the Binn Eco Park land. Mr Swanson explained how the payment system works and when the communities (Glenfarg and three others) will benefit. This depends on the wind generation and loan pay offs, therefore it could be some years away before we see benefits becoming available. The Addendum 3. as attached explains more of the details.

13. Newsletter

Our new Editor, Mr A.Swanson, set out his vision about how the Newsletter could change for the future and there will be an issue in March. Advertisement income more or less pays for the printing costs and it was discussed further how many paper copies of the Newsletter could be produced now that a reduction from approximately 250 – 120 is in place. The income from the Newsletter (per a contribution tin) is gratefully received by the GCC and it helps with the GCC's finances in a small way. An on-line version was discussed as was a more regular A4 size one page interim version of the Newsletter. Presently we shall continue with the paper copy production.

14. Pavement on Main Street Cul-de-sac

An email letter was received from a member of the public regarding PKC's actions to enforce the *no parking on pavements* per the Parking Regulations as of the 6th January and that the Cul-de-sac on Main Street, *identified as a no pavement parking area of concern*, was in fact a Private Road with private pavements. A ticket was issued to a resident's vehicle and whilst CCllr Robertson explained to the best of his knowledge why safety is the focus that there is no exemption (unless categorised per the Reg's) the fact is that tickets could well be issued again. The GCC understands that further communication is to take place between the member of the public and the relevant PKC department, however a further discussion took place regarding erecting a gateway to the Cul-de-sac. This was left with the residents to investigate.

15. Dropped Kerbing on Greenbank Road – Flooding

A general discussion took place regarding the dropped kerbing in front of some properties (including those damaged previously) that may be affected by flood water flowing down Greenbank Road rising over the dropped kerbing in to properties. Cllr Robertson advised that this requires to be rectified in as much that the dropped kerbing needs to be reinstated to normal kerb and pavement height. GCC to raise the matter with PKC as well as Cllr Robertson. *Action Cllr Christie, Cllr Robertson.*

16. GOBS redesign and sub domain

The Secretary of the Glenfarg Oil Buying Syndicate has asked for a hyperlink to attach a Sub domain onto the Glenfarg.org website. Mr Macpherson of Glenfeargach IT consultancy explained what the topic was. Nonetheless, Cllr Ponton asked for a letter to be written to the Secretary of GOBS to enquire what it is required for, how it will work and what will it be able to do. *Action Cllr Pilmer*

17. AOCB

Greenbank Road

It was with concern that the matter of the visual and actual effects of a large mound of earth has arrived on the public road adjacent to the Primary School No stopping Parking zone. It was noted that warning signage and an appropriate barrier system is lacking in their entirety to prevent the public/vehicular traffic coming in to contact with it.

Immediate notification is to be sent to PKC about this matter of safety. *Action Cllr Pilmer*

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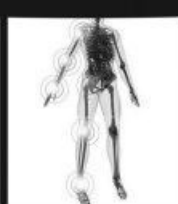

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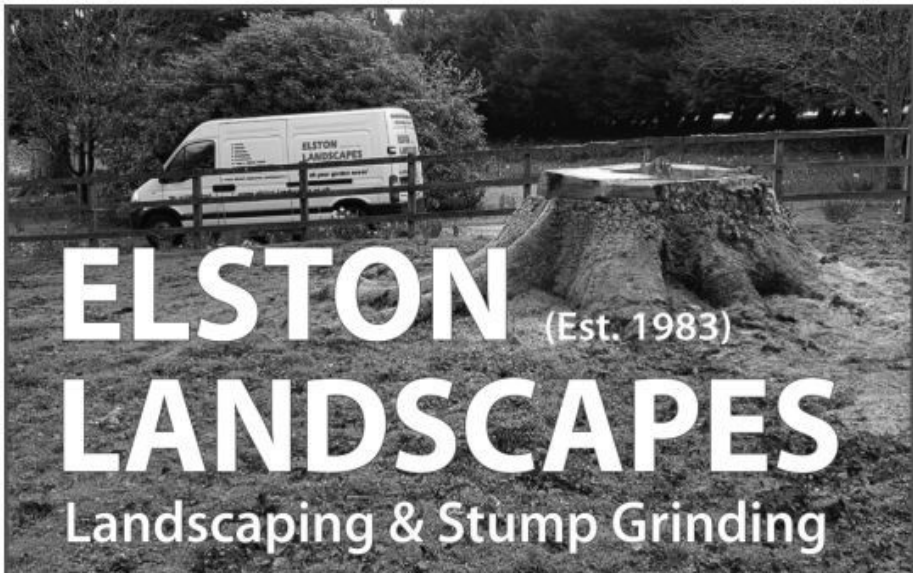
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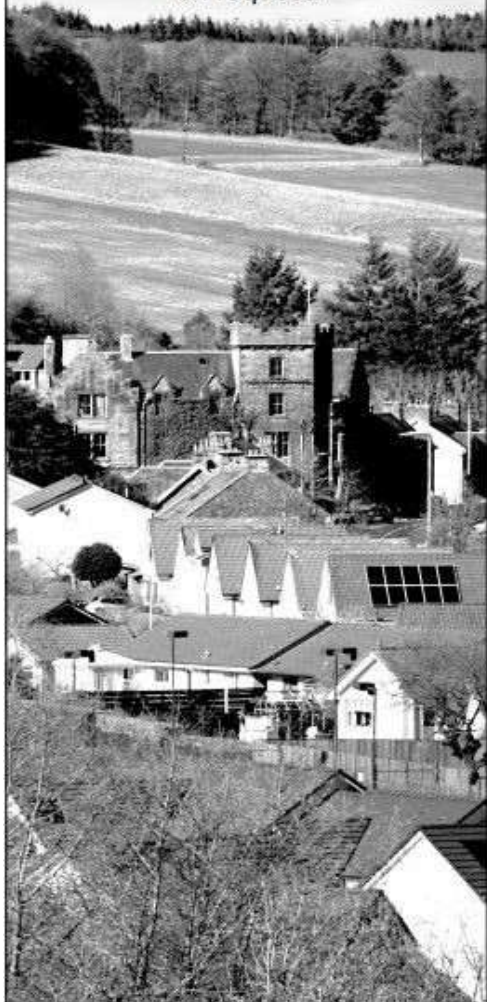
